Individual Racism	A person's beliefs and actions that serve to perpetuate racial oppression. This can be conscious and
	unconscious. This may be externalized or internalized
Institutional Racism	Policies and practices at the organization (or "sector") level that perpetuate oppression. It involves
	unjust policies, practices, procedures, and outcomes that work better for white people than people of
	color, whether intentional or not.
Interpersonal	The interactions between people - both within and across racial groups.
Racism	
Microaggressions	Brief, everyday exchanges that send denigrating messages to certain individuals because of their group
	membership.
Race	A social construct created in the 17th century by white Europeans to justify the enslavement of Africans
	and the spread of colonialism. Understanding of race as a concept has changed over time, but the
	outcomes of discrimination based on race remain entrenched in our systems.
Race Equity Lens	A way of viewing the world in an integrated and holistic manner, taking into account past and present
	racial injustices and seeking to address them through more equitable practices and structures.
Racial Bias	Implicit and/or explicit bias that reinforces discriminatory attitudes and behaviors when interacting
	with people or situations.
Racial Equity	The condition where one's racial identity does not predict their social, health, or economic outcomes.
	Racial equity is a process of eliminating racial disparities and improving outcomes for everyone. It is the
	intentional and continual practice of changing practices, systems, and structures by prioritizing the
	measurable change in the lives of people of color.
Racism	A system of institutional, systemic oppression, and practices of individuals and society that shape
	cultural beliefs and values that support racist policies and practices.
Structural Racism	How these effects interact and accumulate across institutions and across history. Structural racism
	highlights how racism operates as a system of power with multiple interconnected, reinforcing, and
	self-perpetuating components which result in racial inequities across all indicators for success.
Systemic Racism	infrastructure of rulings, ordinances or statutes adopted by a sovereign government or authoritative
	entity, whereas such ordinances and statutes entitles one racial group in a society certain rights and
	privileges, while denying other groups in that society these same rights and privileges because of long-
	established cultural prejudices, religious prejudices, fears, myths, and Xenophobia's held by the entitled
	group.
White Fragility	White fragility refers to feelings of discomfort a white person experiences when they witness or engage
	in discussions around racial inequality and injustice. Their engagement in conversations about racism
	may trigger a range of defensive actions, feelings, and behaviors, such as anger, fear, and silence. These
	reactive behaviors reinforce continued white dominant culture.

Just Cause

- A need to care for a child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse, or domestic partner
- A contagious illness that prevents a member from attending in person;
- A need related to a physical or mental disability that is not otherwise accommodated for; or
- Travel while on official business of the body or another state or local agency.

Emergency Circumstances

• A physical or family medical emergency that prevents a member from attending in person.

HYBRID MEETING NORMS

- 1. Raise your hand (actual or virtual) before speaking

BACKGROUND: HUD COC NOFO

- U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program
- HUD releases a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO), competition for approximately 450 Continuums of Care
- FY 2024-25 and FY 2025-26 CoC NOFO:
 - First time two-year NOFO cycle (was annual competition)
 - Released on July 31, 2024, and made approximately \$3.5 billion available nationally
 - Contra Costa was awarded \$22.3 million in FY 2024

UPDATE: HUD COC NOFO & WORK GROUP

- HUD is indicating that there will be a 2025 CoC NOFO competition which is unexpected
- CoC NOFO Work Group (of the Funding Committee) tasked with improving the CoC NOFO competition process
 - First meeting on 8/19: possible revisions to Renewal Project Scoring Tool

FUNDING UPDATES – FEDERAL BUDGET



- Federal Budget No update since August meeting
 - Both the <u>House</u> and <u>Senate</u> passed appropriations bills for Transportation and Housing and Urban Development (THUD) that increases CoC funding
 - Neither bill contained additional funding for the Emergency Housing Voucher program
 - Congress has until October 1 to pass final FY2026 spending bills or enact a continuing resolution

5) Committee Report Outs

A. Funding Committee

Presenter: Mark Mora, Homebase

The Funding Committee has formed a Continuum of Care Notice of Funding Opportunity (CoC NOFO) Work Group that is tasked with improving the NOFO competition process. The work group will meet roughly every three weeks starting in August and will focus on revising scoring tools and competition policies in preparation of a possible 2025 CoC NOFO competition. This is an unexpected competition because HUD had announced in 2024 that the competition would take place every two years. The committee expects significantly changes on the funding requirements per new HUD priorities and renewal projects are advised on reviewing the APRs from the last completed program year. Homebase will send an email to renewal projects with more information.

B. Youth Advisory Board (YAB) Update

Presenter: Juno Hedrick, Vice Chair and Lived Experience Advisor and YAB Coordinator, and Anastasia Lockwood, YAB Member and Outreach and Retention Subcommittee Facilitator

The Youth Advisory Board provided an overview of YAB's July activities, including subcommittee meetings, new data and research projects, participation in Youth and Young Adult (YYA) strategic planning, and CES Housing Needs Assessment Committee. Upcoming tasks include completing the review of Transitional Housing RFP applicants, planning for a youth Point-in-Time count, and preparing for Homelessness Awareness Month activities. Additionally, YAB is working on three action steps derived from their strategic plan, with Anastasia Lockwood and Juno Hedrick coordinating these efforts. The team also discussed the development of a web presence, the continuation of training sessions, and awaits the release of the HUD Youth Homeless Demonstration Program. B. Funding Updates

The meeting covered several funding updates, including applications that were due on July 25, 2025 for Transitional Housing Request For Proposals (RFP) with notifications to providers expected in August, the Community Care Expansion Preservation Program with a deadline to submit Statements of Interest on August 11, 2025 — which can support operating subsidies or capital projects for existing licensed facilities — and the Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention Program (HHAP) application for Round 6 due August 29. Lastly, the meeting also covered updates on the Federal budget on the Transportation and Housing and Urban Development (THUD) Bill, which included slight increases for the Continuum of Care program but no additional funding for the emergency housing voucher program. Congress has until October 1 to pass a reconciled version or enact a continuing resolution, which would maintain current funding levels.

B. Update: Changes to Brown Act Re: Remote Meeting Attendance and Training Requirements

Presenter: Jamie Schecter, H3

Jamie Schecter presented updates to the Brown Act requirements, explaining that as of March 1, 2023, all council meetings must be in-person or hybrid, with all council members attending in person unless they use just cause or emergency circumstances exceptions. Starting in January this year, a new policy has been introduced where a person using just cause and who has a need related to a disability for which is not otherwise accommodated, allowing for flexible accommodations for members with qualifying disabilities. Qualified members are allowed to attend virtually with specific requirements such as two-way audio and video, camera on, and disclosure of roommates who are present in the room and over 18 years of age. There is also no limit in the number of meetings with this format once the disability accommodation is approved. The procedure on how to request this



accommodation was explained. Council members must now complete all required trainings every two years, including Brown Act, ethics, and implicit bias training.

C. Learning Corner: California Advancing Innovations in Medi-Cal (CalAIM) Enhanced Care Management

Presenter: Pasia Gadson, Contra Costa Health Plan (CCHP)

Pasia Gadson, a nurse practitioner and Director of CalAIM programs and transitional care services at CCHP, presented an overview of the California Advancing Innovations in Medi-Cal (CalAIM) Enhanced Care Management (ECM) program. She explained that ECM is a statewide Medi-Cal benefit focusing on clinical and non-clinical needs of members, particularly people experiencing homelessness, people with serious mental illness, with substance use disorders, or transitioning from incarceration — these individuals are defined as Populations of Focus. Pasia highlighted the program's core services, including outreach and engagement, comprehensive assessments, care coordination, and referrals to community and social support services. She also discussed how providers and community organizations can refer eligible individuals to the ECM program and emphasized the importance of a holistic approach when managing complex cases.

The discussion covered the process for obtaining CalAIM benefits, which are limited to Medi-Cal managed care plan members, and they must meet the criteria of ECM population of focus. Eligible individuals must first have Medi-Cal and be assigned to CCHP, with Kaiser being an alternative only if the member had Kaiser coverage in the previous 12 months. The healthcare options listed on the <u>California Department of Health Care Services</u> (DHCS)'s website helps members find the best plan for their needs, and while CCHP cannot directly assist with switching plans, they can help prevent coverage loss by providing redetermination dates to providers. To learn more about enrolling in MediCal in Contra Costa County, prospective members may visit the <u>Contra Costa County Health's website</u>. - Jamie Schecter shared the flyer of the Elevate East County program, a guaranteed income pilot program in East County which targets young parents with minor children and who are engaged in education at any level. Participants must be enrolled in at least one class at any Contra Costa Community college, must reside in Big Point, Pittsburgh, Antioch, or another district, must be between 18 and 30, must have at least one child ages 0 through 6, and must earn at or below 50% area Median income. The application period is open until August 29, 2025 and link to the Google Form to apply can be found here.
- Alejandra Chamberlain reminded COH members and the public that If anyone come across any children and youth who are not enrolled in a school district, to please reach out to her and she will connect people with the right person.
- Members of the public were invited to the grand opening of the Executive Inn project, funded through the Encampment Resolution Funding (ERF) program in Antioch, on August 14th at noon. H3 is working closely with CORE as well as with Hope Solutions to provide services for the ERF grants in Antioch, San Pablo as well as in Richmond. The partnership also includes Housing Consortium of East Bay, which will be supporting the Antioch projects.
- Courtney Pal shared that she is part of a group of the Permanent Supportive Housing providers who for the past few years have been looking for ways to improve the permanent supportive housing system. Based on this need, they have formed the Nonprofit Housing Association of Northern California (NPH). The main focus is looking at best practices and how to implement it across five different Bay area counties plus Los Angeles. Based on a presentation that H3 gave to NPH, they have developed a memo with best practices. A webinar with their findings will take place on September 18th at 11 am and it will be targeted to people working in the CoCs, with a section for feedback.

Report for the August 11, 2025 Council on Homelessness Meeting

INTRODUCTION

The Council on Homelessness staff report is to inform the Contra Costa Council on Homelessness of the status of projects happening within the Continuum of Care. The report was created to create space on Council on Homelessness meeting agendas for discussion on important issues, to share more information in a digestible format, to make it easier for Council on Homelessness members to review and track ongoing content, and to increase transparency about the work happening within the Continuum of Care. The Council on Homelessness guides the content included in the staff report.

PROJECTS

Project: Concord Naval Weapons Station (CNWS) and Homeless Collaborative

There are no updates at this time.

Technical Assistance (TA) Updates:

COMMITTEES

Equity Committee

The Equity Committee Work Group met on 8/12. Janel presented PIT data through an equity lens. In preparation for an upcoming Nominating Committee meeting, Homebase asked the Equity Committee for feedback on 1) proposed changes to a supplemental application question about equity and barriers to accessing services and 2) possibly providing incumbent council candidates with extra points in the scoring system. Jamie S. notified the group that HUD previously committed to a two-year cycle for the Notice of



Funding Opportunity (NOFO) but are now expected to return to annual NOFOs, which may result in new priorities and requirements. The Work Group spent the remainder of the meeting analyzing data on the Equity dashboard

Funding Committee

- The purpose of the Funding Committee is to direct the community input process for several time-sensitive federal and state funding streams, including updating materials and preparing for the bi-annual Continuum of Care Notice of Funding Opportunity (CoC NOFO) competition.
- A CoC NOFO (Continuum of Care Notice of Funding Opportunity) work group was established to begin preparing improvements for a possible 2025 funding competition. Because a 2025 competition was not expected, the work group is quickly preparing in advance of a NOFO release. The first virtual work group meeting was held on 8/19/25 where the group discussed staff recommended revisions to scoring factors in Renewal Housing Project Scoring Tool. Future meetings will be held on 9/16/25 (virtual) and 9/30/25 (virtual). More meetings may be scheduled as needed.

Nominating Committee

Contra Costa County Homeless System of Care Quarterly Report for Quarter 2, 2025 (April - June)

INTRODUCTION

The Contra Costa Council on Homelessness (CoH), appointed by the Board of Supervisors, serves as the governing and oversight body for the County's Continuum of Care (CoC). Supported by Contra Costa Health's Health, Housing & Homeless Services (H3) Division, the CoC is a collaborative network of service providers, community members, and public and private partners working to end homelessness. This quarterly report provides updates on CoC activities, system data, funding, and policy developments, along with CoH recommendations to support long-range planning and policy for the County's homeless response system. This report was produced on behalf of the CoH by H3 in collaboration with the CoH and CoC partners.

SUCCESS STORY

Pathways to Housing: The Impact of Rick Judd Commons

Maria, a resident at Concord Shelter, had endured years of homelessness as her disability severely limited her housing options. Fortunately for Maria, *Rick Judd Commons* opened this spring. This new affordable housing project with 62-unit affordable housing units, including 13 units set aside for formerly homeless households with disabilities, was made possible through a network of dedicated partners, including *Contra Costa Health's Health, Housing, and Homeless Services (H3), Contra Costa Behavioral Health Division, Resources for Community Development (RCD)*, the *John Stewart Company*, and the *Contra Costa Housing Authority*. Maria and 12 other formerly homeless households with disabilities were referred to the homeless set aside units through Contra Costa's Coordinated Entry System, with the support of *H3's CORE Homeless Outreach and staff at Concord and Brookside Shelter*, the *Bay Area Community Services Delta Landing Team*, and the *Contra Costa Health Enhanced Case Management Team*.

With access to ongoing supportive services through Contra Costa Behavioral Health, on-site supportive services, transit, and community amenities, these 13 households will now have a foundation to rebuild their lives. Maria's story is a testament to what is possible when housing providers, outreach teams, case managers, and community organizations unite to create pathways to housing. Together, we are making a difference—one home at a time.

SYSTEM FUNDING

This quarter the CoC continued to monitor the impact of the new federal administration on Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Continuum of Care (CoC) funding.

FEDERAL



- 2024 CoC NOFO Funding: \$22.3M awarded for renewal and one new project. Grant
 agreements are being issued, with new federal compliance language tied to executive
 orders (e.g., restrictions on gender identity language and immigration status). Agencies
 are advised to consult legal counsel regarding these changes. H3 clarified that HMIS
 does not track citizenship status and recommends continued legal review.
- **HUD CoC Application Debrief:** The local CoC scored highly overall in this national funding competition.
- **USICH Update:** As of March 14, 2025, the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness has scaled back to minimum operations per executive order.
- **CoC Builds NOFO (June):** HUD re-released the capital development NOFO for permanent supportive housing. Hope Solutions' Village of Hope project was re-submitted.

STATE

- Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) FY 2025–26: DCD approved \$399,140 in ESG funding recommendations. Six applications were approved; 7.5% allocated to administration, with the remainder supporting homeless prevention, rapid rehousing, street outreach, and emergency shelter projects.
- AB 109 Funding: H3 informed the Council on Homelessness about new, one-time state funding recommended by the Community Advisory Board on AB 109 Public Safety Realignment to support local housing programs.
- HHAP Round 6: Planning underway for the next Homeless Housing, Assistance and Prevention (HHAP) application. Three stakeholder engagement meetings scheduled to inform budget and priorities, including one co-facilitated with Behavioral Health at June COH meeting. Application due to the State by end of August 2025.

LOCAL

 Housing & Homeless Services RFP: Board of Supervisors approved on April 15, with contracts starting July 1 or later.

DATA

System Performance Measures

In May, the COH received an overview of the HUD System Performance Measures (SPM), a federally mandated report used to assess Continuum of Care (CoC) performance and guide funding decisions. The data—covering metrics such as returns to homelessness, total homeless population, income and employment outcomes, and housing exits—helps track trends, evaluate policy impacts, and inform CoC goal-setting amid shifting funding priorities.

Point in Time Count

The 2025 Point-in-Time (PIT) Count report was released at the end of Q2 and showed a **26% decrease in homelessness** across Contra Costa County compared to last year. On a single night



in January, 2,118 people were identified as experiencing homelessness, 725 fewer people than in 2024.

Additional highlights from the 2025 PIT Count include:

- Homelessness decreased by more than 30% in Central, East and West County.
- Temporary and permanent housing beds increased by 34% since 2023.
- Similar to previous years, 72% of people reported being Contra Costa residents for 10 or more years.

SYSTEM INITIATIVES

The CoC regularly engages in multiple activities, partnerships, evaluations, and improvement that are designed to improve services to clients and achieve various system goals.

CoC Participant Satisfaction Survey

The CoC received 897 participant satisfaction surveys in the month of March across the seven (7) different program models. Read more about the program models here:

This is a 44% increase from 2024. 61% of those surveyed had been accessing CoC services one year or longer with 40% hearing about CoC services from 211 call line or online database. 96% reported they would recommend CoC services to others.

Collaboration

- Contra Costa Health: Behavioral Health conducted a stakeholder feedback session during the 6/4 COH meeting.
- H3 and the Contra Costa Library system co-hosted a "Homelessness 101" community forum on 5/19 at Pittsburg Library, with additional events planned for next quarter. Food and basic survival supplies provided by White Pony Express.

Communications

- CCH: H3 staff presented at the Corporation for Supportive Housing and Housing California conferences, where they showcased Contra Costa's provider training resources and the El Portal Place project.
- CORE mobile outreach was showcased on page 10 in the March/April edition of the City
 of <u>Pleasant Hill's newsletter "The Outlook"</u>.

Engagement of People with Lived Experience of Homelessness (PWLE)

 Staff hosted monthly support meetings for Council members with lived experience of homelessness



 Engaged multiple people with lived experience in Point in Time count planning and execution.

Equity

• Equity Committee continued to refine the Equity dashboard and received demographic data from the Client Satisfaction survey.

Youth and Young Adult Homelessness

This quarter, the Youth Action Board (YAB) key activities included:

- Participated in Innovative Approaches to Youth Engagement in Policy, Democracy, and Participatory Research with UC Berkeley.
- Continued participation in the H3 Housing Needs Assessment Committee, Youth & Young Adults (YYA) Strategic Planning Implementation and Core Meetings, and the Council on Homelessness.
- Took part in the Pride Proclamation at the Board of Supervisors (BOS) June 10th meeting, where YAB members shared key findings from The Opportunity to Change: Community Needs Assessment for YYA Homelessness in Contra Costa County (2024).

Future YAB work includes:

- Participate in the H3 Youth and Young Adult Transitional Housing RFP panel.
- Join the YYA Homelessness & Adultism Train-the-Trainer sessions with the Matthew Aronson Consulting (MAC) team and present during November's National Youth Homelessness Outreach, Prevention, and Education (HOPE) Month.
- Finalize and submit recommendations to the Implementation Committee for the three identified priorities from the Youth and Young Adult Strategic Plan:
 - Resources (Action 1.2): Get a handle on the resources we have and provide a toolkit that helps different stakeholders access resources.
 - · Outreach (Action 1.5): Create and implement an outreach plan.
 - · Safety & Liberation (Action 4.3): Understand how well current partners are welcoming and supporting LGBTQIA+ and BIPOC YYA.

GOVERNANCE/REPORTING

- Approved revisions to Council bylaws, pending County Counsel approval.
- Recommended a new candidate for the City Government Representative seat.
- Following Zoom-bombing incident during the April meeting, transitioned Zoom component of COH meetings "Meetings" to "Webinar" format to reduce the ability of bad actors to disrupt meetings.
- Polls conducted at the beginning of each Council on Homelessness regular meetings capture data on # of Council meetings previously attended, lived experience of homelessness and race/ethnicity of attendees. (See Appendix B for Q2 averages.)

Service Provider Individualized Recovery Intensive Training

SPIRIT is a 9-unit college course taught in collaboration with Contra Costa College from January to May on Mondays and Wednesdays and in June and July on Mondays (in person) with 10 hours a week internship equaling 60 hours. The course teaches students how to develop core skills to empower themselves by attaining and maintaining recovery and resiliency through self-awareness and peer/family support, while learning to assist others in doing the same. The completion of this class leads to a Certificate of Achievement from Contra Costa Behavioral Health and Certificate of Accomplishment from Contra Costa College.

This program is intended for individuals who fit at least one of the following criteria:

- A person who has self-identified as having lived experience and behavioral health recovery.
- A transition-age youth or young adult 18 26 who has self-identified as having lived experience and behavioral health recovery.
- A person with lived experience as a self-identified family member of an adult experiencing a behavioral health condition.
- A person who is parenting or has parented a child or adult experiencing a behavioral health condition. This person may be a birth parent, adoptive parent, or family member standing in for an absent parent.

Goals

- 1. To become more empowered, explore potential and help others learn resiliency and empowerment skills.
- 2. To gain an understanding of the importance of peer and family support as an integral part of the recovery and resiliency journey, as well as to the overall behavioral health system of care.
- 3. To gain a working understanding of Contra Costa Behavioral Health's system of care which includes, Behavioral Health Services, Housing and Homeless Services, and Health Services broadly, and recovery/resiliency-oriented techniques and principles.
- 4. To focus on empowering individuals and communities to take proactive steps toward physical, emotional, and mental wellness through workshops, peer-led discussions, and hands-on wellness tools, using the *Taking Action for Whole Health and Wellbeing* approach.
- 5. To become more aware of community resources which aid peers and their families, including young adults and children, in living successfully within the larger community.
- 6. To explore career options that will help you develop the skills enabling you to find meaningful activity and to learn skills and participate in internship training in the behavioral health field.

Training Components

- I. Intensive Training (SPIRIT I and II): The classroom training takes place during the Spring 2026 college semester (starting in January 2026) in partnership with Contra Costa College. It consists of two separate 3-unit college classes (6 units / 93 hours total), SPIRIT I and SPIRIT II. Students take SPIRIT I for the first half of the semester, and then SPIRIT II during the second half of the semester. Students may not participate in SPIRIT II without successful completion of SPIRIT I.
- II. Work-Study/Summer Internship (SPIRIT III): The work study portion of SPIRIT takes place during the summer 2026 college semester (3 units / 18 hours total), and includes a six-week, 60-hour internship at a human service agency with once-a-week classroom instruction. Students must successfully complete both SPIRIT I and II to participate in SPIRIT III. Students receive 3 units of college credits for successfully completing SPIRIT III (a total of 9 units / 111 hours of class time and 60 hours of internship.
- III. **Allowance:** All students will be eligible for an education allowance to assist with transportation and other expenses needed to complete the training.
