4. RECEIVE the Fiscal Report for January 2025 for CSBG Grant 24F-3007 with three amendments.

Morris presented the fiscal report and stated that we are on track to spend down our grant. Roshunda shared that all demands are in and the subcontractors have expended 100% of their funds.

5. RECEIVE Advocacy Day Updates and APPROVE list of legislation for which to advocate. Castle-Barber shared the list of state legislators for Contra Costa County along with the constituents that will be attending Advocacy Day. Still waiting to schedule two legislators. Castle-Barber shared the following legislation for consideration by EOC: AB 249 - Ramos, AB722- Avila-Farias, AB986 - Lee, SB 18 - Rubio, SB 33- Cortese, SB 411 Perez, AB736

-Wicks, and SB 417 - Cabaldon.

Ward presented the GRIP Public Hearing results and the group that attended the one at Loaves and Fishes shared their experience and deep gratitude to Loaves and Fishes for providing an extra dinner and outdoor set up after their building flooded.

7. RECEIVE presentation on the Key Findings from the 2025 Community Assessment.

Lidete gave a presentation based on the Key Findings from our 2025 Community Assessment. Castle-Barber explained that this data, paired with the results of the four listening sessions (public hearings), will be used to chose priorities for the Community Action Plan next month.

**The Key Findings from the 2025 Community Assessment was received.**

8. DISCUSS and APPROVE the 2026-27 Community Action mission and vision statements.

Castle-Barber reviewed the current vision and mission and shared examples of other statements. For the mission statement, the EOC preferred to use language about investing in the community rather than empowering. Focus on return on investment for addressing the root causes of poverty through funding and partnerships. The EOC liked the staff prompt for the vision statement and preferred to delete the word "creating" at the beginning. It was agreed that Castle-Barber will send out reworked vision and mission statement by email and will collect all input for consideration and approval at the April meeting. Thus, the approval was tabled.

**This approval of the vision and mission statement was tabled to next month.**

9. Staff Report

Castle-Barber gave a Head Start update. Molina gave an update on the Make Parenting a Pleasure training coming up and also gave instructions to the members that are attending Advocacy Day with respect to their travel arrangements and a reminded to keep all receipts to get reimbursed.
