
- On August 13, 2024, Contra Costa County's Health Officer, Dr. Ori Tzvieli, presented mortality data from the County's ATLAS dashboard, covering 2020 to 2022.
- Drug overdose emerged as the leading cause of death among residents aged 25 to 54.
- Residents aged 15 to 24, ranked as second leading cause of death.
- These patterns highlight the need for interventions to address opioid misuse and prevent overdose fatalities across all age groups.



Man Found Dead Inside Bathroom At Concord BART Station

A man was found dead inside the bathroom at the Concord BART station on Tuesday, according to BART officials.

Just after 3 p.m., Officers located an adult male who appeared to be suffering from an apparent drug overdose in the bathroom.

The officers administered two doses of NARCAN and summoned for medical assistance.


Here are the details from BART Police:

NARCAN Deployment – Pleasant Hill Station

7/1/2023 1648 hours An officer administered one (1) dose of NARCAN to an unresponsive male subject who appeared to be suffering from an apparent drug overdose. The subject was transported to an area hospital for further medical treatment.




On Tuesday, the Oakley Police Department responded to two people found unconscious at the Antioch fishing pier parking lot.

At 4:45 pm, Oakley police and Contra Costa County Fire responded to the end of Bridgehead Road. Upon arrival, one victim was cold to the touch and not breathing while the second male was saved by Oakley Police Department officers who had administered a counter acting drug (NARCAN).


Any Opioid-Related Overdose Deaths - Contra Costa County by Sex, 2023

The antidote to an opioid overdose

Naloxone is a life-saving medication used to reverse an opioid overdose, including heroin, fentanyl and prescription opioid medications. Naloxone is most commonly used as a nasal spray (brand name "Narcan"). You don't need to be a medical professional to safely use naloxone on someone experiencing an overdose. Naloxone nasal spray can be purchased at many pharmacies [over the counter](#).

Naloxone is safe and easy to use and works almost immediately. It has very few negative effects, and has no effect if opioids are not in a person's system. Best of all, it can save someone's life!






Naloxone Stand Box Locations



Opioid Response Team

Opioid Response Team (ORT) is comprised of substance use counselors dedicated to outreach and engagement with individuals in need of care and support. ORT provides immediate response and connections to services at key **touchpoints** or key locations where individuals impacted by OUD or SUD can be reached.



ORT's Approach

ORT prioritizes a compassionate, nonjudgmental, and client-centered approach focused on:

- Harm reduction – meeting clients where they are
- Client-driven engagement – Respecting individual needs and choices
- Treatment on demand – offering immediate connection to care
- Compassion, Respect and Hope – Core values in every interaction

Is Crossroads Right For You?

Do You:

- Think it's time to change your addictive thinking and behavior?
- Have a minimum of 90 days remaining of incarceration?
- Want to receive substance abuse treatment while in custody?
- Need a recovery coach to assist you on your journey?
- If you answered yes, we can help!

Requirements

Crossroads is a nine-month program for men.

- 3 months while in custody
- 6 months outpatient substance use treatment post-release

You must also:

- Comply with program rules and guidelines
- Attend all medical, mental health, legal and vocational appointments as scheduled
- Remain in possession of job/ID/insurance

If you are not eligible for the Crossroads Program or prefer a shorter commitment, please call the **Behavioral Health ACCESS Line at (888) 678-7277** or join one of our recovery groups in the Richmond Jail.

What are the benefits?

In Custody (3 months)

- Individualized substance use counseling and assessment
- Cognitive behavioral therapy groups
- Help identifying triggers that cause drug use and criminal behavior
- Develop relapse prevention and life coping skills
- Pre-release planning and preparation – including Medi-Cal enrollment
- Transportation upon release to outpatient program

Post Jail Release (6 months)

- Subsidized recovery housing
- Continued substance use treatment
- Recovery and reentry coaching
- Develop life skills
- Social activities and events
- Resources for mental health, medication assisted treatment, job readiness classes, medical care, and more
- Referrals to self-help and recovery support services





Patient Overview: 17-year-old male with opioid use disorder (OUD), passive tobacco exposure, cannabis use, and co-occurring ADHD, anxiety, and depression.
Primary Concerns: OUD, mental health challenges, inconsistent medication adherence, and frequent missed appointments.
Treatment Challenges: Fluctuating adherence to MAT, missed follow-ups, and ambivalence toward long-term medication use.
