# COC PROGRAM MODELS

# HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION PROGRAM MODEL

**Purpose:** To keep people from experiencing literal homelessness for the first time or returning to it after being permanently housed

**Eligibility:** Must meet HUD definition of “at-risk” within 14 days (unless funding source allows for more flexibility)

**Referral Process:** Coordinated Entry - 211

**Required Elements:** Housing problem solving and financial assistance

# RAPID EXIT PROGRAM MODEL

Purpose: To those who literally homeless to exit the homeless system of care to temporary or permanent housing using housing problem solving and one-time financial assistance if needed.

Eligibility: Individuals and families who are literally homeless and have a housing solution identified.

Referral Process: Coordinated Entry – CORE, CARE Centers and Shelters

Required Elements: Trauma-informed housing problem solving, financial assistance

# CARE CENTER (CASE MANAGEMENT) PROGRAM MODEL

Purpose: To serve as a CE access point for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness by providing basic needs services such as meals, showers, laundry and case management

Eligibility: Individuals and families experiencing unsheltered homelessness for case management

Referral Process: Self Refer, 211, CORE

Required Elements: Drop-in center and housing focused case management

# OUTREACH PROGRAM MODEL

Purpose: To serve as a CE access point for people experiencing unsheltered homelessness by providing basic needs services such as meals, showers, laundry and case management

Eligibility: Individuals and families experiencing unsheltered homelessness for case management

Referral Process: 211, press 3 for CORE

Required Elements: Drop-in center and housing focused case management

# SHELTER PROGRAM MODEL

**Purpose:** To provide trauma-informed, safe interim housing for people experiencing literal homelessness while supporting their access to permanent housing opportunities.

**Eligibility:** Individuals and families experiencing literal homelessness; Priority given to families, seniors (62+), and people with multiple disabilities

**Referral Process:** Coordinated Entry - CORE (with some shelters being self refer)

**Required Elements:** Housing focused case management, 2 meals per day and no lengths of stay

# RAPID REHOUSING (RRH) PROGRAM MODEL

**Purpose:** Permanently housing literally homeless individuals and families by providing housing location, move in assistance, medium-term subsidy that tapers down over time, and trauma informed supportive services that connect participants to community supports to help sustain their housing

**Eligibility:** Individuals and families must be literally homeless

**Referral Process:** Coordinated Entry

**Required Elements:** Housing First, Critical Time Intervention, medium-term rental assistance, assist with securing income, housing location, follow up assessments

# PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING (PSH) PROGRAM MODEL



- **Purpose**: Permanently house the most vulnerable in the CoC with permanent rental subsidy and supportive services.
- **Eligibility**: Chronically homeless individuals and families with documented permanent disabilities
- **Referral Process**: Coordinated Entry
- **Required Elements**: Housing First, voluntary services, participants pay no more than 30% of their income towards rent, housing location if scattered site.
