### Please explain why you would like to serve on the Council on Homelessness and in the specific Council seat(s) you are applying for. (400 word maximum) \*

I would like to serve on the Council on Homelessness in the CoC/ESG grantee employee seat because my professional experience, leadership background, and commitment to equity align directly with the Council's mission to end homelessness through collaboration, innovation, and accountability. In my current role as Director of Re-Entry Housing and Services at Hope Solutions, I oversee multiple federally funded programs that provide housing-focused support services for justice-involved individuals and people at risk of homelessness. This includes managing contracts funded through HUD, CoC, and other streams, ensuring compliance with national guidelines, and leading a team of program managers and frontline staff who provide direct housing navigation, rapid rehousing, permanent supportive housing, and prevention services. I also represent the organization in board meetings, county partnerships, and advocacy efforts, giving me a strong understanding of how local governance and funding decisions impact service delivery on the ground. Previously, I managed navigational services at Bay Area Community Services, which provided clients with education and employment support, housing through Rapid Rehousing (RRH) and ESG-funded programs, and access to mental health and substance use services. These services were holistic and client-centered, addressing not only housing but the broader barriers that prevent long-term stability. In this role, I worked closely with funders, community partners, and staff to ensure program effectiveness, contract compliance, and positive outcomes for participants. I bring several key strengths to the Council: Experience in housing and reentry services, including expertise in managing multimillion-dollar contracts and designing culturally responsive programs. Commitment to data-driven decision-making, with a background in program evaluation, HMIS compliance, and continuous quality improvement. Dedication to racial equity and advocacy, ensuring that Black and marginalized communities most impacted by systemic barriers are centered in policy and program design. I hold a Master's Degree in Organizational Leadership from St. Mary's College of California and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice, which equip me with organizational strategy skills and systemic knowledge to contribute meaningfully to governance discussions. The CoC/ESG grantee seat offers a critical perspective: the voice of those working directly within funded programs who understand both challenges and opportunities of implementation. My experience overseeing reentry and housing navigation programs across Contra Costa County gives me a clear view of what is working, what gaps remain, and how the system can evolve to better serve our most vulnerable neighbors. It would be an honor to contribute my experience, leadership, and advocacy to the Council on Homelessness.

I bring a combination of professional expertise, leadership experience, and community connections that I believe would be a valuable contribution to the Council on Homelessness. Professionally, I have spent more than a decade directing housing, reentry, and youth development programs across Contra Costa, Alameda, and San Francisco Counties. In my current role as Director of Re-Entry Housing and Services at Hope Solutions, I oversee multiple federally funded programs that support justice-involved individuals and people at risk of homelessness. I lead teams that provide housing navigation, rapid rehousing, permanent supportive housing, and prevention services. This work has given me extensive experience in contract compliance, program development, and data evaluation while building trusted relationships with county agencies, probation, public defenders, and community partners. My previous work at Bay Area Community Services focused on navigational services that connected clients to education, employment, housing through RRH and ESG funding, and access to mental health and substance use support. At East Oakland Community Project, I directed transitional housing and shelter programs, managing large multidisciplinary teams and ensuring contract compliance with HUD and city funders. These roles strengthened my skills in staff development, cross-system collaboration, and designing holistic services that address the full spectrum of barriers faced by individuals and families experiencing homelessness. Beyond professional experience, I bring a deep commitment to racial equity and community advocacy. Much of my work has centered on African American and marginalized communities disproportionately impacted by homelessness and systemic barriers. I am comfortable with public speaking, presenting to boards and community groups, and advocating for policy changes that reflect the needs of the people we serve. I also bring long-standing connections to organizations addressing homelessness. My roles have required direct collaboration with county housing departments, service providers, and reentry coalitions, giving me a strong network that I can leverage in Council discussions. Additionally, my early work with the Boys & Girls Club of San Francisco gave me firsthand experience supporting unhoused and at-risk youth, counseling families in crisis, and developing programming that promotes stability and opportunity. I hold a Master's Degree in Organizational Leadership and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice, providing both academic grounding and practical skills in governance, strategy, and systems change. Altogether, I bring leadership, advocacy, equity-driven perspective, and cross-system experience that align closely with the goals of the Council and the seat I am applying for.

5. Unhoused people in Contra Costa County come from many different backgrounds in terms of race, ethnicity, culture, ability, age, sexual and gender identity, and immigration status. Please list and explain 3 reasons why certain groups might have a harder time accessing services than others. (400 words maximum) \*

In my experience working in housing and reentry services, I have seen firsthand how people experiencing homelessness in Contra Costa County come from many different backgrounds. At the same time, I have also observed how certain groups face additional barriers that make it more difficult for them to access services. Three reasons stand out:

1. Systemic Racism and Historical Inequities

African Americans and other communities of color often encounter barriers rooted in systemic racism. Practices such as redlining, discriminatory lending, overpolicing, and mass incarceration have all contributed to the disproportionate representation of Black residents in the homeless population. Even when services are available, bias—whether intentional or not—can create added obstacles and erode trust. Without culturally responsive approaches, many community members disengage from systems that were designed to help them.

2. Language, Immigration Status, and Cultural Barriers

Immigrant families and non-English-speaking residents frequently struggle to connect with services. Language access is not always consistent, and without translation or bilingual staff, critical information is missed. Families who are undocumented often avoid seeking help altogether out of fear that sharing personal information could place them at risk. When programs are not designed with cultural competence, residents already experiencing instability become further disconnected from resources that could support long-term housing stability.

3. Stigma, Accessibility, and Specialized Needs

LGBTQ+ individuals, people with disabilities, and older adults face unique challenges in accessing services. For example, transgender individuals may not feel safe in shelters that are not gender-affirming. People with physical or developmental disabilities may encounter facilities that are not fully accessible. Older adults experiencing homelessness often have medical or mobility needs that go unmet in programs built primarily for younger populations. These gaps limit options for groups that are already vulnerable.

Addressing these barriers requires intentional strategies, including trauma-informed and gender-affirming practices, expanded language access, culturally rooted outreach, and enhanced ADA compliance. By centering equity in program design, Contra Costa County can ensure that all residents, regardless of race, status, ability, or identity, have meaningful access to the housing and services they need to thrive.

pro ho ap evi	expand Prevention and Diversion Resources of often, people enter homelessness because there are not enough resources available to stabilize them before they lose housing. Prevention programs that wide flexible financial assistance—such as help with rent arrears, utility payments, or move-in costs—can make the difference between stability and entering melessness. However, many of these resources are limited in scope or too narrowly defined by funding restrictions. Contra Costa County could strengthen this proach by expanding its investment in flexible prevention funds, streamlining the referral process, and making services more accessible for those at risk of action or displacement. In particular, creating more accessible partnerships with landlords and property managers could reduce barriers for tenants who may be revise be quickly pushed into homelessness due to rising rents or minor lease violations. Prevention not only saves public resources in the long run but also reserves the dignity and stability of families before they experience a crisis.

Many clients face complex barriers—ranging from ntal health challenges and substance use disorders to unemployment or justice involvement. Without integrated support, even when people obtain housing, y may struggle to sustain it. Contra Costa County could expand the availability of housing navigators who not only help clients secure units but also connect m to wraparound supports such as employment services, behavioral health care, and peer support. Prioritizing culturally competent, trauma-informed, and uity-centered approaches would also help ensure that services meet the needs of Black and marginalized communities, who are disproportionately impacted, ditionally, creating more pathways for people with lived experience of homelessness to serve as peer navigators would strengthen trust and engagement.

### **Qualifications and Volunteer Experience**

I am seeking to serve on the Council on Homelessness in the CoC/ESG Program Grantee seat because I believe my experience leading a Continuum of Care-funded agency uniquely positions me to help strengthen the countywide homeless response system. As Executive Director of the Greater Richmond Interfaith Program (GRIP), I oversee a family emergency shelter, a warming center for single adults, a community meal program serving 80,000+ meals annually, and case management and housing navigation services that directly rely on CoC and ESG funding. These programs give me daily insight into the challenges unhoused individuals face—from systemic barriers like limited affordable housing to urgent issues like mental health crises, domestic violence, and safety concerns in encampments. My interest in serving on the Council is rooted in a deep commitment to equity and collaboration. Having worked in homeless services for over two decades—including as executive director of Raphael House and CEO of Hunters Point Family—I have learned that successful solutions require a coordinated system where providers, government agencies, and those with lived experience work together. I want to contribute to shaping that system in Contra Costa by bringing the provider perspective into CoC decision-making and ensuring that resources are allocated where they will have the greatest impact. I also bring experience in policy and governance that will be valuable to the Council. As a former co-chair of San Francisco's Local Homeless Coordinating Board, I worked closely with city departments to oversee federal CoC funding, develop coordinated entry policies, and review performance outcomes. This experience will allow me to engage quickly and effectively with the Council's responsibilities -reviewing program performance, setting funding priorities, and advising on system improvements. Ultimately, I want to ensure that Contra Costa's homeless services system is inclusive, trauma-informed, and responsive to the diverse needs of those it serves—including survivors of domestic violence, families with children, and people with complex behavioral health challenges. Serving on the Council would allow me to amplify the voices of GRIP's clients, contribute to countywide solutions, and collaborate with partners to advance our shared goal: ending homelessness and helping every individual move toward safety, stability, and self-sufficiency.

I bring more than 20 years of experience leading nonprofit human service programs and a deep commitment to supporting unhoused individuals and families in Contra Costa County and beyond. As the Executive Director of the Greater Richmond Interfaith Program (GRIP), I oversee a comprehensive array of services that include a family emergency shelter, a warming center for single adults, a daily community meal program, and a resource center offering case management, housing navigation, and outreach to encampments. These programs give me a direct and current perspective on the complex barriers faced by people experiencing homelessness in our county. Before joining GRIP, I served as CEO of Hunters Point Family and Executive Director of Raphael House, San Francisco's largest family homeless shelter, and I co-chaired San Francisco's Local Homeless Coordinating Board, where I worked with city officials, service providers, and people with lived experience to shape homelessness policy. Earlier in my career. I directed large family and single-adult shelters in the Bronx and Miami and led youth workforce programs that connected disadvantaged youth to education and employment opportunities. As Executive Director of the Greater Richmond Interfaith Program (GRIP), I oversee a family emergency shelter, a warming center for single adults, a community meal program serving 80,000+ meals annually, and case management and housing navigation services that directly rely on CoC and ESG funding. These programs give me daily insight into the challenges unhoused individuals face—from systemic barriers like limited affordable housing to urgent issues like mental health crises, domestic violence, and safety concerns in encampments. My interest in serving on the Council is rooted in a deep commitment to equity and collaboration. Having worked in homeless services for over two decades—including as executive director of Raphael House and CEO of Hunters Point Family—I have learned that successful solutions require a coordinated system where providers, government agencies, and those with lived experience work together. I want to contribute to shaping that system in Contra Costa by bringing the provider perspective into CoC decision-making and ensuring that resources are allocated where they will have the greatest impact. I also bring experience in policy and governance that will be valuable to the Council. As a former co-chair of San Francisco's Local Homeless Coordinating Board, I worked closely with city departments to oversee federal CoC funding, develop coordinated entry policies, and review performance outcomes. I would like to serve on the Council on Homelessness because my professional experience and personal commitment are closely tied to advancing housing stability and reducing barriers for people at risk of or experiencing homelessness in Contra Costa County. As a legal aid attorney and currently the Managing Attorney of Bay Area Legal Aid's Contra Costa office, I lead a team that provides legal services in housing, domestic violence, youth justice, reentry, and public benefits. Across these practice areas, I see daily how homelessness is not just the loss of housing, but the result of intersecting systems that often fail to meet people's needs. I have represented tenants facing eviction and displacement, survivors of domestic violence struggling to secure safe and stable housing, and individuals reentering the community from incarceration who encounter systemic barriers to housing and employment. These experiences give me a perspective on how housing instability intersects with trauma, discrimination, and systemic inequities. They also highlight the importance of collaboration between legal services, housing authorities, social service providers, and community-based organizations. I want to bring this perspective to the Council to help identify where systems break down and how we can respond more effectively and equitably. In my role, I have also worked on countywide initiatives—including AB 109 reentry planning and Measure X service expansions—that require balancing community input, service delivery realities, and systemic reforms. I believe these experiences prepare me to contribute thoughtfully to the Council's mission of guiding decisions, sharing ideas, and ensuring that homelessness services are working well.

I would bring to the Council a combination of professional expertise, collaborative experience, and community relationships that directly intersect with homelessness in Contra Costa County. As the Managing Attorney for Bay Area Legal Aid's Contra Costa office, I oversee a multi-practice team providing services in housing, domestic violence, reentry, and public benefits. This role requires not only subject-matter expertise but also systems-level perspective—identifying gaps, building partnerships, and advocating for reforms that improve outcomes for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Professionally, I have represented hundreds of tenants facing eviction and displacement, ensuring they can remain housed or secure stable alternatives. I have worked with survivors of domestic violence whose pathways to safety often depend on access to emergency shelter and long-term housing stability. I have also supported individuals reentering from incarceration, advocating to remove barriers in housing and employment that too often result in cycles of homelessness. The following questions will be used by the Council on Homelessness' Nominating Panel to identify diverse applicants that can contribute unique expertise and perspectives to the Council. Answers to these questions will be evaluated in relation to the experience and qualifications desired for available member seats. Please carefully consider how your personal experiences, professional experiences, and values will contribute meaningfully to the Contra Costa County Continuum of Care efforts to make homelessness rare, brief, and non-recurring.

Please note, there are two required elements of the Council on Homelessness application, these "Supplemental Questions" and the County Application. You **must complete both** components of the application by **Thursday, September 25, 2025 at 5PM.** Instructions for completing the County Application will be sent to you after completing the "Supplemental Questions" below.

### **Supplemental Questions**

0	<b>Behavioral Health Representative</b> – Must work in the behavioral health field in Contra Costa County (i.e., peer support, clinician, system-level behavioral health planner, etc.) with experience impacting behavioral health policy, decision-making, and/or funding.
0	City Government Seat – Must be an employee of a city or town located in Contra Costa County. This seat is not open to representatives elected to positions in Contra Costa County
0	<b>CoC/ESG Program Grantee</b> – Must work with an agency receiving Continuum of Care and/or Emergency Solutions Grant funding in Contra Costa, including agencies that are providing housing and/or services to survivors of domestic violence. Applicants must work with one of these agencies to be eligible: CCH: H3; Contra Costa Crisis Center; Contra Costa Housing Authority; GRIP; Hope Solutions; SAHA; SHELTER, Inc; STAND! For Families Free of Violence; Trinity Center
0	Community Member Seat – Must live or work in Contra Costa County.
0	Federal Homeless and Housing Funding Administrator Representative – Must work for an agency in Contra Costa County that administers federal funding for homelessness and/or housing programs.
0	<b>Employment and Human Services Department (EHSD) Representative</b> – Must work for the Contra Costa Employment and Human Services Department.

1. Which vacant Council on Homelessness seat are you applying for? \*

 Please explain why you would like to serve on the Council on Homelessness and in the specific Council seat(s) you are applying for. (400 word maximum) \*

I would like to serve on the Council on Homelessness because my professional experience and personal commitment are closely tied to advancing housing stability and reducing barriers for people at risk of or experiencing homelessness in Contra Costa County. As a legal aid attorney and currently the Managing Attorney of Bay Area Legal Aid's Contra Costa office, I lead a team that provides legal services in housing, domestic violence, youth justice, reentry, and public benefits. Across these practice areas, I see daily how homelessness is not just the loss of housing, but the result of intersecting systems that often fail to meet people's needs. I have represented tenants facing eviction and displacement, survivors of domestic violence struggling to secure safe and stable housing, and individuals reentering the community from incarceration who encounter systemic barriers to housing and employment. These experiences give me a perspective on how housing instability intersects with trauma, discrimination, and systemic inequities. They also highlight the importance of collaboration between legal services, housing authorities, social service providers, and community-based organizations. I want to bring this perspective to the Council to help identify where systems break down and how we can respond more effectively and equitably. In my role, I have also worked on countywide initiatives—including AB 109 reentry planning and Measure X service expansions—that require balancing community input, service delivery realities, and systemic reforms.

Please briefly describe any personal or professional skills, experiences, volunteer work, or connections (such as affiliations with organizations addressing homelessness) that you would bring to the Council on Homelessness and/or the specific seat you are applying for. I would bring to the Council a combination of professional expertise, collaborative experience, and community relationships that directly intersect with homelessness in Contra Costa County. As the Managing Attorney for Bay Area Legal Aid's Contra Costa office, I oversee a multi-practice team providing services in housing, domestic violence, reentry, and public benefits. This role requires not only subject-matter expertise but also systems-level perspective—identifying gaps, building partnerships, and advocating for reforms that improve outcomes for people experiencing or at risk of homelessness. Professionally, I have represented hundreds of tenants facing eviction and displacement, ensuring they can remain housed or secure stable alternatives. I have worked with survivors of domestic violence whose pathways to safety often depend on access to emergency shelter and long-term housing stability. I have also supported individuals reentering from incarceration, advocating to remove barriers in housing and employment that too often result in cycles of homelessness. These experiences have deepened my understanding of the ways trauma, discrimination, and poverty converge in housing instability. I also bring significant experience in coalition work and public engagement. I regularly collaborate with local governments, housing authorities, probation, medical providers, and community-based organizations on initiatives such as AB 109 reentry planning and Measure X-funded services.

	Unhoused people in Contra Costa County come from many different backgrounds in terms of race, ethnicity, culture, ability, age, sexual and gender identity, and immigration status. Please list and explain 3 reasons why certain groups might have a harder time accessing services than others. (400 words maximum) *  I've worked as a legal aid attorney in Contra Costa for 17 years, and much of that time has been spent not only helping dients directly, but also thinking about how our services connect—or don't connect—with the larger network of care. What I've seen is that certain barriers consistently keep people from accessing the support they need, and those same barriers show up across the homelessness system.  One major issue is disability. Many services are still not fully accessible for people with physical or psychiatric disabilities. A shelter or other service provider might not accommodate mobility limitations, or program rules might unintentionally exclude someone living with a mental health condition. Without accommodations built in, people who need services the most often end up excluded.  A second barrier is immigration status and language access. Families without legal status may avoid services altogether because of fear of deportation or public charge rules. Even when they are eligible, they may not have access to translation, interpretation, or culturally competent staff. That leaves many immigrant households unable to navigate systems that are already complex for anyone.  A third challenge I've seen is the way services are often siloed. Each provider may be focused on its own area—housing, health, legal, probation—without enough coordination across systems. For someone experiencing homelessness, this means being sent from one agency to another, repeating their story over and over, and still not getting connected to comprehensive support. The lack of collaboration between providers creates barriers just as real as transportation or funding gaps. This is why I think the work of the Council is so importa

	've seen in my work in Contra Costa that many of the challenges people face aren't about the absence of services, but about how difficult it can be to connect to them. The County has made important progress in recent years—particularly in building more coordination across providers and in investing in prevention strategies—but there is still more that can be done. One area is creative approaches to prevention. It is far more effective to keep people housed than to try to rehouse them once they've lost their home. The County has already invested in rental assistance and legal aid partnerships, which have made a real difference.
	I think community education deserves more emphasis. Many residents don't know the protections they already have under tenant law or fair housing rules, and too often that lack of knowledge leads to unnecessary housing loss. Outreach in multiple languages, done through trusted community spaces, can empower people to protect their housing and assert their rights. It also helps combat discrimination, which remains a root cause of instability.
