EQUITY DEFINITIONS

(adapted from C4 Innovations and approved by Council on Homelessness on 8/3/23)

Term	Definition
Individual Racism	A person's beliefs and actions that serve to perpetuate racial oppression. This can be conscious and unconscious. This may be externalized or internalized
Institutional Racism	Policies and practices at the organization (or "sector") level that perpetuate oppression. It involves unjust policies, practices, procedures, and outcomes that work better for white people than people of color, whether intentional or not.
Interpersonal Racism	The interactions between people - both within and across racial groups.
Microaggressions	Brief, everyday exchanges that send denigrating messages to certain individuals because of their group membership.
Race	A social construct created in the 17th century by white Europeans to justify the enslavement of Africans and the spread of colonialism. Understanding of race as a concept has changed over time, but the outcomes of discrimination based on race remain entrenched in our systems.
Race Equity Lens	A way of viewing the world in an integrated and holistic manner, taking into account past and present racial injustices and seeking to address them through more equitable practices and structures.
Racial Bias	Implicit and/or explicit bias that reinforces discriminatory attitudes and behaviors when interacting with people or situations.
Racial Equity	The condition where one's racial identity does not predict their social, health, or economic outcomes. Racial equity is a process of eliminating racial disparities and improving outcomes for everyone. It is the intentional and continual practice of changing practices, systems, and structures by prioritizing the measurable change in the lives of people of color.
Racism	A system of institutional, systemic oppression, and practices of individuals and society that shape cultural beliefs and values that support racist policies and practices.
Structural Racism	How these effects interact and accumulate across institutions and across history. Structural racism highlights how racism operates as a system of power with multiple interconnected, reinforcing, and self-perpetuating components which result in racial inequities across all indicators for success.
Systemic Racism	infrastructure of rulings, ordinances or statutes adopted by a sovereign government or authoritative entity, whereas such ordinances and statutes entitles one racial group in a society certain rights and privileges, while denying other groups in that society these same rights and privileges because of long-established cultural prejudices, religious prejudices, fears, myths, and Xenophobia's held by the entitled group.
White Fragility	White fragility refers to feelings of discomfort a white person experiences when they witness or engage in discussions around racial inequality and injustice. Their engagement in conversations about racism may trigger a range of defensive actions, feelings, and behaviors, such as anger, fear, and silence. These reactive behaviors reinforce continued white dominant culture.

HUD COC NOFO

- Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds the Continuum of Care (CoC) Program, releases an annual Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) competition
- HUD has committed to noncompetitively renew the remaining FY 2025 grants expiring in Q3 and Q4 – closes the book on rehashing the rescinded FY 2025 NOFO
- What we know about the FY 2026 CoC NOFO :
 - The lowest HUD can set Tier 1 at is 60% of Annual Renewal Demand – it was 30% in the rescinded FY 2025 CoC NOFO which was unprecedented
 - HUD is required to publish the FY 2026 NOFO by June 1, 2026 with awards made by December 1, 2026
 - HUD estimates post date (5/29/26) and application due date (8/26/26)
 - Stay tuned, contact contracosta@homebaseccc.org with questions

UPDATE

- HUD released the FY 2024 and FY 2025 CoC NOFO on July 31
- First 2-year competition (more details to come) but we expect the process to be similar to previous years
- Complete CoC grant application due October 30 (~ 90 days)
- Local application deadline for renewal projects was July 31
- Mandatory TA Workshop will be held in 2-3 weeks, date TBD

Programs and Services Impact During Renovation

- No impact on Emergency Shelter or Residential Programs for Women and Women with Children.
- Men's Emergency Shelter will shower in our shower trailer
- Approximately 25% capacity reduction in Men's Emergency Shelter
- Approximately 10% capacity reduction in the Men's Residential Life Transformation Program
- Community Meals will be served in our chapel – 123 Macdonald Ave, at the same times (6 am, 12 pm, 5 pm)

A. Governance Committee (ACTION ITEM)

Presenter: Jamie Schechter, H3

The Governance Committee met twice earlier this year to review the Governance Charter and Bylaws and to reflect on current operations and increase the overall impact and efficiency of the Council. The main revision areas included: a) updating the Membership section to make language more consistent; b) updating the Committee and Work Group section per the consolidation of committees and to reflect current configuration; and c) aligning the document with Federal policy. In terms of next steps, the Contra Costa County Counsel will review and suggest any needed changes followed by a review and approval by the Council on Homelessness. B. Youth Action Board (YAB) Update

Juno Hedrick shared the different activities that YAB members accomplished in the month of March, which included bimonthly hybrid meetings with H3 and RYSE, subcommittee communications, National YAB Connection Space, peer support meetings, training on impact of stipends on taxes and benefits, among others. The activities for the month of April will include strategic planning for youth and young adults, Contra Costa Budget Justice Coalition Youth Academy, youth survey planning, etc. Anyone interested in connecting with YAB can send an email at ContraCostaYAB@cchealth.org or call at (925) 500-3237.

6) Old Business

A. Point-in-Time Count (PIT) and Client Satisfaction

Presenter: Janel Fletcher, H3

H3 collected a total of 560 post-PIT surveys which ended on March 9, 2026. The purpose was to learn more about the cause of unsheltered homelessness in the community as well as the collection of demographic data and needs. PIT data is due to HUD by April 30, 2026, and once approved, the final results will be shared with the Council and CoC community. Janel thanked all of the volunteers for their support. In addition, H3 will be distributing the participant satisfaction survey in the month of April, and it will help to gather feedback about the experience of people accessing services across Contra Costa County's system of care and identify service gaps which will then be used to improve service delivery. 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B. Sector Report Outs from Council Members

Speaker: All members

- Wayne Earl shared that the Bay Area Rescue Mission is collaborating with The Salvation Army and Adult & Teen Challenge on a nationwide research initiative, called the Better Together Project, that is part of the City Gate Network. This research study aims to measure the impact of faith-based programs, convey the benefits of such programs, and attract evidence-based outcomes that demonstrate participants' progress. The research focuses on seven key domains that are considered essential indicators of overall well-being: a) happiness and life satisfaction; b) mental and physical health; c) meaning and purpose; d) character and virtue; e) close social relationships; f) financial and material stability; and g) religious community and faith. The Bay Area Rescue Mission is the first organization to partner with the City Gate Network. The surveys have been developed and tested, and data collection has now begun and will continue for the next 18–24 months. More information about this program can be found at the [Teen Challenge's website](#).
- The tattoo removal project, overseen by The Healthcare for the Homeless agency, will start the first week of May. Staff will receive training in the month of April. A flyer with criteria and eligibility will be shared soon.
- Courtney Pal and Mary Juarez-Fitzgerald gave a report out of their participation at the Housing California Conference in Sacramento City last month. They presented a panel on improving access to Coordinated Entry through policy changes and the overall engagement from participants was a success.

C. Funding Updates

Speaker: Jamie Schechter and Christy Saxton, H3

The Funding Committee met on March 17, 2026 to build tools and processes that can be flexible to the current competition environment based on lessons learned from the CoC NOFO new requirements at the end of last year and beginning of 2026. The Committee will meet again on April 28 to discuss scoring tool revisions and policies that effect renewal projects. Current grantees, H3, Housing Authority, Hope Solutions, Shelter, Inc., are highly encouraged to attend. Secondly, the recent Executive Order 14173 which terminates illegal discrimination preferences for housing placement, it is now replaced with restoring merit-based opportunity. Per this chance, the General Services Administration is updating its website, SAM.gov, and will have registrants to certify compliance, which increases the risk for agencies to receive federal funding. H3 recommends that all HUD funded agencies review and assess compliance. To read more about the Ending Illegal Discrimination and Restoring Merit-Based Opportunity Executive Order, you may visit the United States Government's [Federal Register website](#). In addition, Contra Costa County and Contra Costa CoC still await the grant agreement for the Homeless Housing Assistance and Prevention



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Program (HHAP-6) from the State. The joint award amount to be received is \$6.7 million. The California Department of Housing and Community Development's [website](#) has more info about the program and requirements. Lastly, the funding recommendations for the Consolidated Housing and Homelessness Request for Proposal has been delayed. Agency providers have been notified in advance of the Board of Supervisors approval and will soon receive their application scorecard. The awards include funding from Measure X, HHAP-5, HHAP-6, Coordinated Entry, County General Funds, and Employment and Human Services Department's housing programs.

7) New Business

A. (ACTION ITEM) Presentation - County and State Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Recommendations for Upcoming Fiscal Year

Presenter: Melanie Erickson, *Contra Costa County Department of Conservation and Development*

Melanie Erickson provided an overview of the ESG program, which is a Federal program that provides funds for a variety of activities to address homelessness as authorized under the Hearth Act and State program requirements. Contra Costa County receives State ESG funds from the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) on an entitlement formula basis for the provisions of essential services for the homeless, including emergency shelter operations, homelessness prevention, and rapid rehousing activities. On March 25, 2025, the Board of Supervisors adopted and approved the 3-year contract and also approved the funding recommendations for the five applications that were received. This is the second year of the 3-year funding resolution, and the same five applications from the first cycle are being recommended. For fiscal year 25-26, the County will receive a total of \$229,545 of state ESG funding, which is approximately \$75,000 less that was received from previous fiscal year 24-25. The list of the approved applications with applicant name, project name, description, activity type, and amount funded was shown and may also be found at H3's [website](#). Contra Costa County, acting as an entitlement jurisdiction, also receives ESG funds from HUD for essential services for the homeless population. On October 14, 2025, the Department of Conservation and Development released its fiscal year 2026-27 Notice of Funding availability for CDBG and ESG funds. A total of six applications were received to cover funding activities for homelessness prevention and rapid rehousing, street outreach, and emergency shelter. The estimate amount to be received from HUD is expected to be \$405,597. The list of approved applications and funding amount can be found at H3's [website](#). These recommendations will be forwarded to the Board of Supervisors for final approval.

C. Learning Corner: Transitional Rent

Speaker: Mary Juarez-Fitzgerald, *H3*, Ryan Tapia, *H3*

Mary Juarez-Fitzgerald presented the concept of Transitional Rent (TR) 101, its referral requirements and process. The program launched on January 1st, 2026, and eligibility requirements include: 1) to be enrolled in CCHO Medi-Cal; 2) target population should be under serious mental illness or substance use disorder; 3) to experience housing instability; and 4) to be on the pathway of permanent housing. The requirements and ways to submit referrals were shared. One of the questions from members of the public was how long the approval process takes, for which Mary answered that typically it takes approximately five days.
