3. RECEIVE and APPROVE Meeting Record of Action from September 8, 2025, of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee.

The Committee unanimously APPROVED the Record of Action from the February 18, 2025, meeting with no changes.

4. RECEIVE presentation on the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan as it pertains to Climate Action and Adaptation Plan implementation and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

The Committee ACCEPTED the presentation from Staff and Nicole Shimizu, Planner with the Department of Conservation and Development, regarding the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan, and provided direction to Staff.

Shimizu provided an overview of the County's role as convener and facilitator, including coordination with partner agencies, cities, and community stakeholders. The presentation highlighted grant funding received through the Ocean Protection Council, the plan's alignment with regional and County climate planning efforts, and key milestones, including community engagement and anticipated plan development and adoption timelines.

The Committee emphasized the importance of completing the plan ahead of the 2034 deadline and acknowledged ongoing regional efforts to accelerate shoreline adaptation planning.

The Committee discussed jurisdictional responsibilities and coordination among cities. Vice Chair Gioia inquired about required versus voluntary participation under State law and expressed interest in advancing a multi-jurisdictional approach to improve cost-effectiveness and regional consistency. Staff clarified that the current Memorandum of Understanding facilitates collaboration but does not require a joint plan, and noted that additional coordination or structural changes could support a multi-jurisdictional effort.

The Committee discussed regional collaboration models and the potential benefits of shared planning, including cost savings and comprehensive shoreline management.

Chair Burgis raised questions regarding financial commitments and capacity constraints for participating cities. Staff clarified that current participation requires staff time only and does not obligate cities to provide funding. Chair Burgis noted challenges faced by some cities, including staffing and financial limitations, and emphasized the importance of inclusive coordination.

The Committee discussed continued outreach to cities to encourage participation in a coordinated planning effort.

5. RECEIVE presentation on the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

The Committee ACCEPTED the presentation from Staff and Emily Groth, Planner with the Department of Conservation and Development, regarding the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy, and provided direction to Staff.

Groth provided an overview of the Shoreline Leadership Academy, a program designed to build residents' capacity to participate in sea level rise planning processes. The program will include approximately 20 participants from across Contra Costa County, meeting over a six-month period beginning in January 2026. The program is funded through the Bay Conservation and Development Commission and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, and includes partnerships with community-based organizations and regional agencies.

Staff reported that the application period closed on October 15, 2025, with 101 applications received from across the County. The selection process aims to create a cohort representative of the shoreline region, with additional opportunities for non-selected applicants to participate through future community engagement efforts.

The presentation included an overview of participant demographics, curriculum topics aligned with regional planning efforts, and planned field trips to various shoreline locations to support hands-on learning.

Chair Burgis commented on the level of participation and noted trends in applicant demographics.

Vice Chair Gioia inquired about eligibility requirements and geographic representation, including whether participants must reside within shoreline jurisdictions. Staff clarified that applicants must be Contra Costa County residents, but do not need to live directly along the shoreline, and that selection prioritizes individuals with lived experience or connection to shoreline areas.

The Committee discussed the selection process, representation across regions of the County, and the timeline for finalizing the participant cohort.

6. ACCEPT the report on Staff Activities supporting the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee.

The Committee ACCEPTED the report of Staff activity supporting the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee and provided direction to Staff.

Staff provided a summary of recent activities, including ongoing efforts to secure grant funding to support shoreline planning work. Staff reported that recent federal grant applications were not successful and noted that efforts to pursue additional funding opportunities will continue.

Staff highlighted continued coordination and collaboration with regional and state partners, emphasizing that shoreline adaptation planning efforts are gaining momentum across jurisdictions.

The Committee discussed changes in federal funding priorities and participation, including reduced engagement from federal agencies and evolving grant language. Staff noted the need to remain flexible and adapt to shifting funding opportunities.

Chair Burgis raised concerns regarding the reliability of data and monitoring systems used to inform sea level rise planning. Staff indicated that current efforts rely on regional data sources, including those developed by the Bay Conservation and Development Commission, and acknowledged potential challenges related to reduced federal staffing supporting data collection.

The Committee discussed broader impacts of climate change on the Delta, including reduced freshwater flows, saltwater intrusion, and implications for flood management, water supply, and ecosystems.

Vice Chair Gioia inquired about the Delta Adapts initiative and its relationship to local planning efforts. Staff provided an overview of the Delta Plan and clarified that while it addresses flood management and long-term resilience, it does not impose the same sea level rise planning requirements as regional shoreline adaptation efforts.

The Committee discussed the interconnected nature of Delta and shoreline conditions and the importance of continued coordination across planning efforts.

PUBLIC COMMENT:

Naama Raz-Yassif, The Watershed Project, commented that Delta regions may be more impacted by flooding from increased storms associated with climate change.

Referral History:

Phoenix Armenta, San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission Senior Manager for Climate Equity and Community Engagement, provided a presentation on the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy to the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee on June 13, 2024. County staff gave updates on the Shoreline Leadership Academy at the September 8 and December 8, 2025, Committee meetings.

The Contra Costa Shoreline Leadership Academy is an opportunity to build capacity in the communities along the County's shoreline by offering a six-month long training to participants focused on learning about the shoreline, climate change, sea level rise, and related planning processes. The Shoreline Leadership Academy curriculum is based on the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission's One Bay Vision and tailored to fit the local context.

Referral Update:

Since the last time the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee received an update on the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy, the project team selected a cohort of 23 residents to participate in the program. The Shoreline Leadership Academy began on January 10, 2026. To date, seven sessions have been held online and in-person at various locations across the county shoreline.

RECEIVE presentation on the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

Fiscal Impact (if any):

The costs in staff time and materials for the Department of Conservation and Development's work activities associated with the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee are funded by the Measure X - Climate Equity and Resilience Investment allocation administered by the Department. The Department continues to pursue opportunities for grant and other funding mechanisms to support this effort.

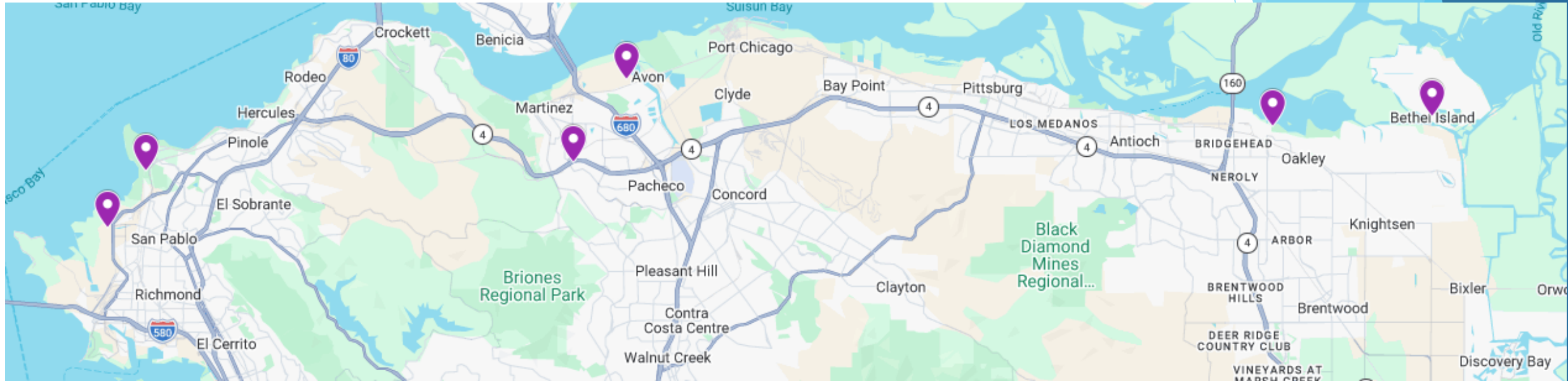

Referral History:

Sea level rise is projected to accelerate over the next century. Without preparation and planning, increased sea levels will result in increased temporary and permanent inundation of the Contra Costa shoreline with no regard for jurisdictional boundaries. To address this cross-jurisdictional hazard, Contra Costa County will develop the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan (Plan) for the county's entire unincorporated shoreline that will be developed in close coordination with all shoreline cities.

The Plan will:

- comply with the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission's (BCDC) adopted Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP) Guidelines and incorporate the 2024 State of California Sea Level Rise (SLR) Guidance.
- include an update to the county's existing vulnerability assessments.
- be built upon an extensive community participatory engagement and visioning campaign and shaped by robust input from local agencies and stakeholders through the Resilient Shoreline Coalition.
- include adaptation pathways and implementation actions at a more granular level than what has been developed previously through larger regional efforts, exploring natural and constructed infrastructure improvements.
- embody a community-driven vision for the future of Contra Costa's shoreline centered on the values and priorities of environmental justice communities and chart an equitable path forward towards priority shoreline adaptation projects.

The development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan will build capacity and provide a strong foundation for Contra Costa County's efforts to proactively prepare for and respond to the impacts of sea level rise.

Referral Update:

Since the last time the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee received an update on the Contra Costa County Resilient Shoreline Plan, the County has onboarded our consultant team and submitted its Notice of

Intent (NOI) to prepare a Subregional Shoreline Adaptation Plan to BCDC. The NOI was determined to be complete on March 25, 2026. The project team will meet with BCDC in April for an initial consultation.

RECEIVE presentation on the Contra Costa County Resilient Shoreline Plan and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

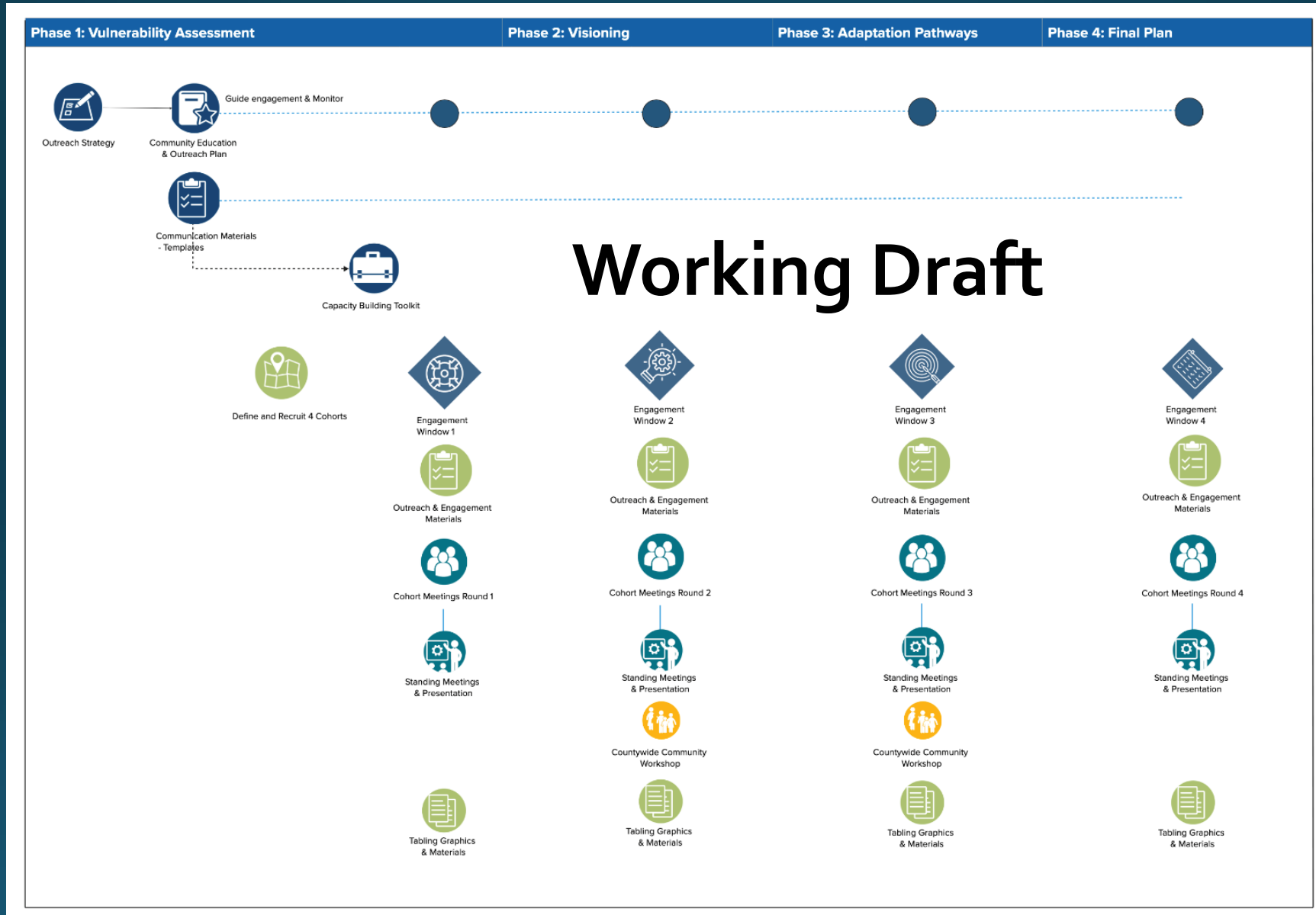

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Staff Report for Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee

April 13, 2026

Key activities since the Resilient Shoreline Committee's meeting on December 8, 2025, are listed below.

Senate Bill 1 Grant

The \$1,499,285 grant awarded by the California Ocean Protection Council (OPC) through the [Senate Bill 1 Sea Level Rise Adaptation Planning Grant Program](#) (SB 1 Grant Program) is supporting the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan (Plan).

- County staff completed the contract process with the community engagement subconsultants and technical subconsultant to provide services to support the development of the Plan. Following a Request for Proposals process, the Watershed Project and BluePoint Planning were selected as the community engagement subconsultants, and Environmental Science Associates (ESA) was selected as the technical subconsultant.
- The Watershed Project and BluePoint Planning have begun developing a Community Education and Engagement Plan to inform equitable shoreline resilience planning and ensuring the Plan is grounded in community need.
- ESA and County staff have begun compiling data on existing plans and policies; physical and ecological conditions of the landscape; and existing local populations, land uses, assets, and services within the Plan area to develop Element B: Existing Conditions.
- Staff submitted the third quarterly report to OPC in January 2026.

- The County submitted its Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare a Subregional Shoreline Adaptation Plan to the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC). The NOI was determined to be complete on March 25, 2026. The project team will meet with BCDC in April for an initial consultation.

Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy

- The project team selected a cohort of 23 residents to participate in the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy (SLA).
- The SLA began on January 10, 2026, and is currently just over halfway complete. Over seven sessions, participants have learned from experts in sea level rise and shoreline issues, visited locations across the entirety of the county shoreline, and worked on final projects that will be presented at the SLA graduation. The program will conclude in June 2026.

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Coalition

- Staff continue to meet with other local and regional public agencies to coordinate sea level rise planning efforts and build the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Coalition to support the planning and development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan.
- Staff continue to participate in regional sea level rise planning to raise awareness of the County's adaptation and resilience planning efforts and to ensure the Plan is consistent with regional guidelines.

Other Grant Opportunities

- **National Coastal Resilience Fund 2026 – Pre-Proposal submitted.** On March 31, 2026, staff submitted a pre-proposal for the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation's (NFWF) 2026 National Coastal Resilience Fund to support development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan.

- Staff continue to monitor state and federal grant opportunities and prepare to apply for funding to support the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan. The Plan will create focused adaptation strategies and implementation actions for the communities along Contra Costa County's shoreline.
