Chair Gioia confirmed with Vice Chair Burgis that the December 8, 2025 meeting record was acceptable as presented.

4. RECEIVE presentation on the Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

The Committee RECEIVED the report.

Staff introduced Emily Groth, Planner with the Department of Conservation and Development (DCD) on the Sea Level Rise team, who splits her time between Water Agency/Delta-related work and sustainability, to present an update on the Shoreline Leadership Academy.

Committee members noted having each visited the Academy in session, including a recent tour of oyster balls at Point Pinole, and commented on the strong turnout, diversity of participants, and high level of interest and engagement countywide.

Ms. Groth reported that the Shoreline Leadership Academy's goal is to build residents' capacity to participate in the county's sea level rise planning process, in support of the county's forthcoming Resilient Shoreline Plan. The project team selected 23 paid participants, who have been meeting for four hours every other Saturday over a six-month period beginning January 10, 2026. The program is funded by the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) through a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) grant, with a project team consisting of The Watershed Project, Contra Costa Resource Conservation District, BCDC, the Delta Stewardship Council, and the Exploratorium.

Ms. Groth summarized sessions held to date: an introductory session on January 10 covering Sea Level Rise 101 and BCDC's Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP); a January 24 session in Bethel Island on the Delta and levees; a February 7 session on critical infrastructure, including tours of Wildcat Marsh, the West County Wastewater treatment facility, and the North Richmond Living Levee project; a February 21 visit to Big Break Regional Shoreline in Oakley to discuss public access, recreation, and environmental justice in the Delta; a March 7 tour of Pacheco Marsh covering project history, flood management, interagency coordination, and an introduction to permitting; a March 21 virtual session on shoreline contamination and remediation methods; and a session on April 4 at Point Pinole with a guest presenter reviewing oyster reef nature-based shoreline adaptation.

Ms. Groth stated that five sessions remain, with the next session that Saturday, and that participants are developing final projects, including community surveys, social media campaigns, tabling events, and community presentations, to be shared at a graduation ceremony at the program's final session in June.

In response to a question from Chair Gioia regarding the program timeline, Ms. Groth confirmed the Academy runs January through June, meeting every other Saturday, with

graduation anticipated on June 13, 2026. She noted staff were seeking a shoreline-area venue able to accommodate approximately 50 participants and family members, and that Rosie the Riveter and the Exploratorium had been considered but were unavailable.

Vice Chair Burgis suggested the Martinez Yacht Club and the County's own administration building, and Chair Gioia suggested the former Shell clubhouse in Martinez, as possible graduation venues, noting Martinez's central, convenient location within the county. Staff indicated a formal request from a Committee member would be needed to consider use of the administration building.

5. RECEIVE presentation on the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan and provide direction to staff as appropriate.

The Committee RECEIVED the report.

Staff presented an update on the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan, prepared under a grant agreement with the Ocean Protection Council (OPC). The consultant team, consisting of The Watershed Project and BluePoint Planning (community engagement) and Environmental Science Associates (technical lead), is under contract and meeting biweekly with the County. Staff reported approximately \$1.5 million in OPC funding supports three phases: community visioning, data and information gathering, and adaptation pathways, with an equity assessment addressing both scientific and social vulnerability throughout.

Staff reviewed a working draft map of four proposed shoreline segments covering the county's unincorporated areas, noting Richmond and Pittsburg are preparing their own separately funded plans, and that a Notice of Intent for the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan had been accepted by the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC), with an initial consultation meeting scheduled the following Wednesday.

In response to questions from Chair Gioia, staff clarified that, absent multi-jurisdictional agreements, the plan currently covers unincorporated areas only, though developing MOUs with interested cities lacking their own funding remains a goal. Chair Gioia offered to work with cities in his district toward that end. Staff noted Pinole and Hercules had since secured their own OPC funding and intend to prepare a joint plan, and confirmed no unincorporated area lies between them. Staff added that extending adaptation planning into other city jurisdictions would require additional funding, and that city planning capacity remains a concern.

In response to a question from Vice Chair Burgis, staff confirmed the equity assessment addresses both scientific and social vulnerability, noting social impacts are harder to mitigate and that "vulnerable communities" can be defined differently by region.

Staff presented the proposed community engagement plan, focused on four cohorts of 10 to 20 participants per shoreline segment, with engagement including tailored outreach, cohort meetings, standing committee presentations, and countywide meetings. Vice Chair Burgis and Chair Gioia both expressed support for segmenting the shoreline as a way to tailor planning to each area's characteristics.

Staff noted strong interest in the related Shoreline Leadership Academy, which received about 100 applications for 20 spots, and intends to build on that momentum. Staff indicated no further direction was needed at this time, noting the plan will be refined following BCDC's initial consultation, and thanked The Watershed Project, BluePoint Planning, and ESA for their work. Vice Chair Burgis offered continued availability to support the effort.

The Committee RECEIVED the report.

Staff reported this is a standing item intended to keep the Committee and public informed of ongoing work. Staff noted recent developments not yet reflected in the plan, including coordination with the National Park Service and with the Navy and Army Corps of Engineers regarding the Military Ocean Terminal Concord, with a meeting being arranged between the respective vulnerability assessment teams to ensure consistent mapping and data. Staff also reported a meeting with PG&E, which is separately conducting a vulnerability assessment of its shoreline assets, and noted that BCDC's RSAP Atlas, which maps regional shoreline assets, ends at BCDC's jurisdictional boundary; staff has asked PG&E whether comparable data exists for the rest of the county and how it might be obtained.

In response to a question from Vice Chair Burgis regarding rail infrastructure near the shoreline, staff indicated rail will be a challenge, noting outreach to rail contacts has not yet yielded a response, and that a more discrete, specific request may be more effective. Vice Chair Burgis and Chair Gioia identified two rail lines in the area, likely BNSF and Union Pacific. Vice Chair Burgis noted her periodic contact with Union Pacific and asked that Committee members flag relevant rail concerns as they arise so they can be raised in future conversations. Staff indicated it will reach out to the railroads when appropriate, and Chair Gioia and Vice Chair Burgis both offered to assist with that outreach.

Referral History:

Sea level rise is projected to accelerate over the next century. Without preparation and planning, increased sea levels will result in increased temporary and permanent inundation of the Contra Costa shoreline with no regard for jurisdictional boundaries. To address this cross-jurisdictional hazard, Contra Costa County will develop the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan (Plan) for the county's entire unincorporated shoreline that will be developed in close coordination with all shoreline cities.

The Plan will:

- comply with the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission's (BCDC) adopted Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP) Guidelines and incorporate the 2024 State of California Sea Level Rise (SLR) Guidance.
- include an update to the county's existing vulnerability assessments.
- be built upon an extensive community participatory engagement and visioning campaign and shaped by robust input from local agencies and stakeholders through the Resilient Shoreline Coalition.
- include adaptation pathways and implementation actions at a more granular level than what has been developed previously through larger regional efforts, exploring natural and constructed infrastructure improvements.
- embody a community-driven vision for the future of Contra Costa's shoreline centered on the values and priorities of environmental justice communities and chart an equitable path forward towards priority shoreline adaptation projects.

The development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan will build capacity and provide a strong foundation for Contra Costa County's efforts to proactively prepare for and respond to the impacts of sea level rise.

Referral Update:

The County has been coordinating with the Ocean Protection Council (OPC), BCDC, and city staff to determine a path forward to expand the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan as a multijurisdictional plan.

The costs in staff time and materials for the Department of Conservation and Development's work activities associated with the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee are funded by the Measure X - Climate Equity and Resilience Investment allocation administered by the Department. The Department continues to pursue opportunities for grant and other funding mechanisms to support this effort.

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan Update

August 10, 2026

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan Timeline

October 7, 2023: Senate Bill 272 signed

Senate Bill (SB) 272 requires local governments in coastal zones to develop sea level rise plans. For Bay Area jurisdictions, these subregional shoreline adaptation plans must be approved by the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC).

December 5, 2024: Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP) adopted

BCDC adopted the RSAP which includes guidelines for subregional adaptation plans as required by SB 272.

June 16, 2025: SB 1 Grant MOU signed

The County and cities of Antioch, Hercules, Martinez, Oakley, Pinole, Pittsburg, and San Pablo entered into a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan through the OPC SB 1 Grant Program.

April 15, 2026: BCDC Subregional Shoreline Adaptation Plan initiation meeting

The County and its consultants met with BCDC to formally kick off its subregional shoreline adaptation plan development process.

June 4, 2024: County awarded Ocean Protection Council (OPC) SB 1 grant

The County received almost \$1.5 million for the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan through OPC's first round of SB 1 Grant Program funding.

May 2025: County OPC SB 1 grant award executed

County and OPC staff finalized workplan, and agreement was signed by all parties.

November 18, 2025: Consultant Contracts approved

In June 2025, the County released two Requests for Proposals, one for a technical consultant and one for a community engagement consultant. Environmental Science Associates was selected as the technical consultant. The Watershed Project was selected as the community engagement consultant with BluePoint Planning as a subconsultant.

January 1, 2034: Local Plan deadline for BCDC approval

Local governments must have sea level rise plans approved by BCDC by 2034. Local governments with approved sea level rise plans are prioritized for funding to implement sea level rise adaptation strategies and recommended projects in the local government's approved sea level rise plan.

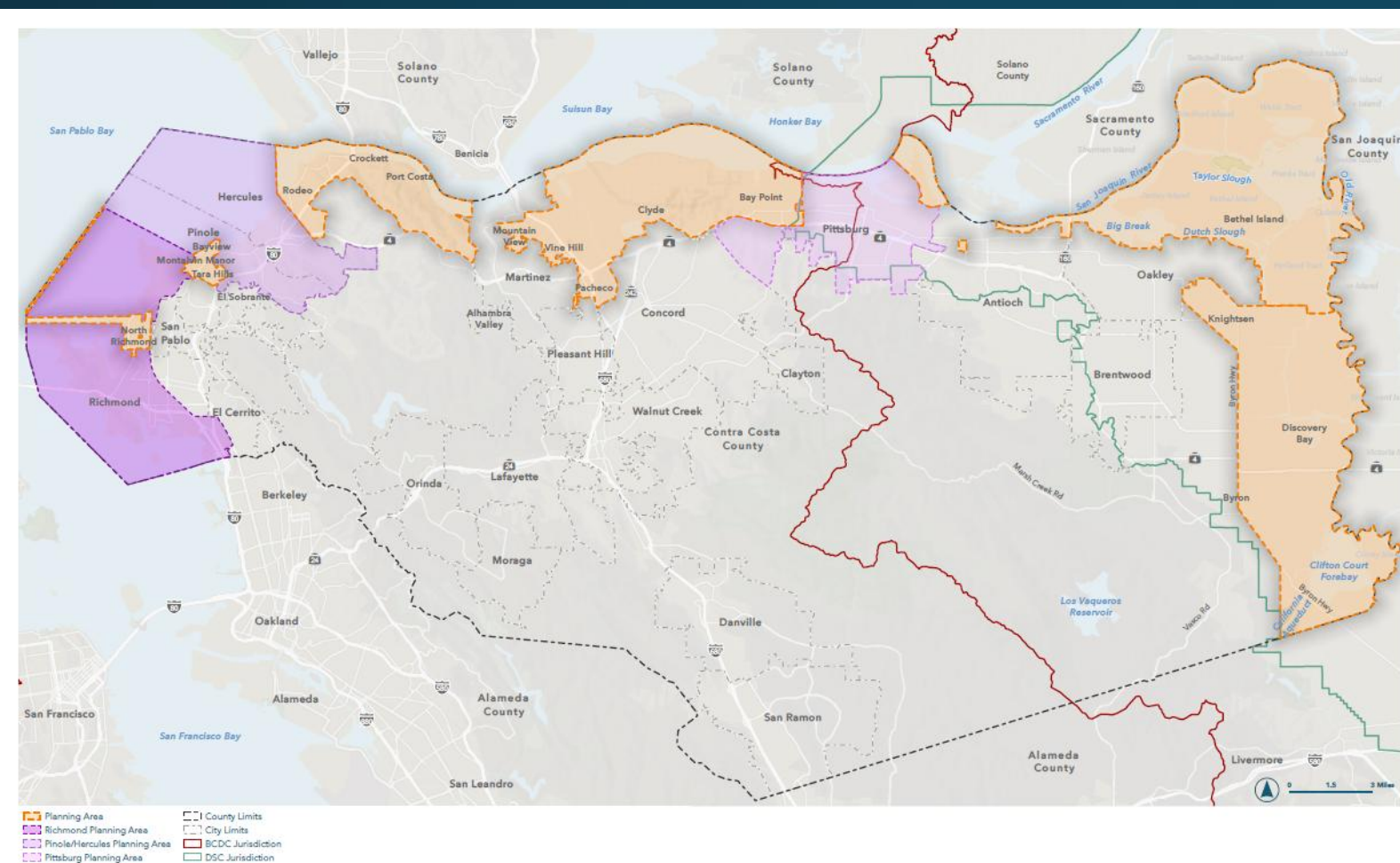

 - Develop a realistic **adjusted timeline** for development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan
 - **Facilitate coordination with cities** participating in the multijurisdictional plan
- Benefits of pivoting now to a multijurisdictional plan:
 - County can provide additional capacity to shoreline cities
 - Efficiencies with plan development and community engagement efforts
 - Will set up the Contra Costa shoreline for future implementation funding

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Staff Report for Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Committee

August 10, 2026

Key activities since the Resilient Shoreline Committee's meeting on April 13, 2026, are listed below.

Senate Bill 1 Grant

The \$1,499,285 grant awarded by the California Ocean Protection Council (OPC) through the [Senate Bill 1 Sea Level Rise Adaptation Planning Grant Program](#) (SB 1 Grant Program) is supporting the development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan (Plan).

- The project team (County, Environmental Science Associates (ESA), The Watershed Project, and BluePoint Planning) had an initial subregional shoreline adaptation plan consultation meeting with the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission (BCDC) on April 15, 2026. The Notice of Intent to initiate development of a subregional plan in accordance with the Regional Shoreline Adaptation Plan (RSAP) was posted the week following the meeting as required by BCDC.
- ESA completed the initial admin draft of Element B: Existing Conditions for the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan. County staff are in the process of reviewing the admin draft of Element B, which will then be shared with BCDC for review.
- The Watershed Project and BluePoint Planning completed an initial Community Education and Engagement Plan to inform equitable shoreline resilience planning and ensure the Plan is grounded in community need. This will be updated as outreach for the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan begins.
- The application period for the Resilient Shoreline Community Advisory Cohorts opened in June and closed in July. Recruitment flyers and an outreach toolkit were

shared with a variety of organizations in English and Spanish. The project team is in the process of reviewing the 135 applications received.

- Staff submitted the fourth and fifth quarterly reports to OPC in April and July 2026.
- In response to interest among Contra Costa cities in developing a multi-jurisdictional plan, County staff have been coordinating with OPC, BCDC, and city staff to determine a path forward for developing a multi-jurisdictional plan, including necessary budget and timeline adjustments.

Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy

- The Contra Costa County Shoreline Leadership Academy (SLA) concluded on June 13, 2026, with a graduation ceremony at Big Break Regional Shoreline in Oakley. 21 Contra Costa County residents graduated from the program, presenting their final project to the group on topics ranging from increasing permitting transparency to youth education to improving habitat for native species and more.
- Over the course of the program, participants attended 12 sessions for four hours every other Saturday from January through June 2026. The sessions included eight field trips to various locations along the Contra Costa shoreline, from the San Francisco Bay to the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta.

Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Coalition

- Staff continue to meet with other local and regional public agencies to coordinate sea level rise planning efforts and build the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Coalition to support the planning and development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan. Currently, coordination is focused on filling data gaps for Element B: Existing Conditions.
- Staff continue to participate in regional sea level rise planning to raise awareness of the County's adaptation and resilience planning efforts and to ensure the Plan is consistent with regional guidelines. This included staff participation in BCDC's first

RSAP Peer Learning Community, where local government staff across the Bay Area have an opportunity to learn from each other throughout the subregional plan development process.

Other Grant Opportunities

- **National Coastal Resilience Fund 2026 – Not selected to submit a full proposal.**

On May 21, 2026, staff were notified that the County was not selected to submit a full proposal after submitting a pre-proposal for the National Fish & Wildlife Foundation's (NFWF) 2026 National Coastal Resilience Fund to support development of the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan.

- Staff continue to monitor state and federal grant opportunities and prepare to apply for funding to support the Contra Costa Resilient Shoreline Plan. The Plan will create focused adaptation strategies and implementation actions for the communities along Contra Costa County's shoreline.
