A. CAPH Federal Medical & State Policy Update

Erica Murray explained one of many hurdles Contra Costa is likely to face in both the near term in the medium and potential long term coming now. Described what's happening at the state level and the budget deal that was recently passed in June 2025. The impact of H.R. 1 key federal funding that might impact the future state action items this Fall or in the next Legislative Session. Budget Reconciliation bill included action over the course of 10 years. The items that were proposed by the state we didn't like we worked on getting them removed or to a later timeline.

Challenges

Direct hit to fight anything H.R. 1 on undocumented. Reduction in FMAP for Emergency Services for Undocumented Childless Adults. Federal match for emergency care for undocumented adults drops from 90% to 50%.

Changes to FMAP have affected us in many ways and was a must come out piece. In the end, H.R. 1 was a terrible bill that could have been worse. For the states that were covering the undocumented was stopped reduction, we were able to secure and stop something negative from happening from 90% to 80% of the total expansion population would be extremely detrimental to the public healthcare system.

Immediate happenings - Uniformity requirements Manage Care Organization (MCO) tax Medicaid supplemental payments used for increased providers rates. It is understood politically that heavy commercial folks are not going to be approved and most likely will go away and create a 3.5 billion dollar deficit to the state General Fund and providers will not see those dollars.

- H.R. 1 Implementation Timeline 2025 2028
 - October 1, 2025 DSH Cuts Take effect:
 - \$8 billion in Disproportionate Share Hospital
 (DSH) cuts move forward as scheduled.
 - December 31,2025
 - o Rural Relief Fund

- Early 2026
 - HHS must issue guidance on new six-month Medicare eligibility checks. County and State are starting to ask how we will implement this. Medicaid will continue.
- October 1, 2026
 - Reduction in FMAP for Emergency Services
 Undocumented Childless Adults
- January 1, 2028
 - State Directed Payment (SDP) Phase Down Begins
- October 1, 2028
 - Provider Tax Reductions Begins: From 6% to 3.5% by Fiscal Year 2032
 - New Copay Requirements
- Potential Executive Actions
 - Medicaid DSH Cuts (Oct 1, 2025) \$44M in federal funding annually for Contra Costa Health Services (CCHS)
 - Second Budget Reconciliation
 - Possible Federal Regulations
 - Anticipating federal guidance
 - CalAIM Waiver Renewal (Dec. 2026)
 - For CCHS: \$8.8 million in Safety Net Care Pool (federal) at stake.
 - ~\$22M of DSH funding at risk (half of \$44M total)
 - Federal Workforce Challenges
 - Equity & Gender Affirming Care

Brian B. – MCO tax is an impact of the state budget? What will the ramification be for us?

Eric M.- \$3.5 billion that the state was planning on through MCO tax no longer going to get.

Sup Gioia- H.R. 1 tried to get Republican rural area relief fund and only help those rural areas of (50 Billion Dollars).

Erica M. - Each state gets the same amount. California is going to get the same about in rural hospital relief as Delaware.

Sup Gioia: What are the impacts for Contra Costa of losing 44 million in DSH?

D. Culberson: Eventually going to lead to service cuts. We're working to manage our overtime and registry of our non CCRMC staff.

Sup Gioia: What does a service cut inquire?

Sergio U. – Informed longer wait time for any who has specialty services such as Neuro, Derm, Gastro not specific we would have to go and figure out which one is worse will have increase waits once impact budget cuts happen. Any service we offer will be affected.

Gioia - When will it start to affect us?

Erica M. - Early part of 2026

- B. Finance Report Brian Buchanan
 - FY 24/25 Preliminary Operational
 - FY 2024 actual Capital Expedited
 - FY 24/25 Forecasted Revenue by source (in \$M's)
 - Fy 25/26 EF1 Total Forecasted Revenue from all sources is \$839.3M GPP that flows through our 1115 waiver which will likely not be renewed.
 - CCRMC 5-Year Expenditure and County Subsidy Trend
 Expenditures growth over the past couple of years at
 5.9% point 4.2% subsidy growth is smaller.

Sup Gioia: requested clarity on the colors of the chart (PPT.23). Total Expenditure (light blue), Subsidy (dark blue) and Measure X (brown). The whole system in cost is going up and the percent of total system itself is not going up.

- D. Parking Structure Update (Est 40 million project)
 - Public Works Program
 - 216 parking spaces short, currently we are anticipating estimated 400 on Lot C will determine more once we receive a more complete study. No funding identified through measure X continues working on finding funding. CCRMC believe the construction will take about 2 years. Working with building projects scopes for alternative solutions on the constructure site.
- E. CCRMC Seismic Project Update
 - Initial Measures X estimated for 5 projects: Public Health Lab (\$25M), Parking structure (\$15M), Interventional Radiology (\$5M) Psychiatric Emergency Service (\$5M) and Medical Office Building (\$30M) Total \$80M.
 - Seismic Compliance Project is the highest project priority deadline of January 1, 2030. Food Service is a mandated service for Hospital Inpatient. The seismic scope includes three separate food service projects: Food Service/Cafeteria

- Building Replacement (SPC), Sprinkler Line Spaces (NPC-4), and Water, Wastewater and Fuel Storage (NPC5).
- Measure X funding approved by Board of Supervisors on October 22, 2024.
- On March 25, 2025 TrueBeck Construction awarded a
 Design/Building Entity contract by Board of Supervisors to
 develop conceptional design and construction documents.
 The estimated project cost for three story Food Service
 replacement building and two Non-Structural Category
 (NPC) components are \$140-145 million.
- CCRMC will provide Joint Conference Committee with updates at each upcoming session regarding development and implementation of projects.
