5. Unhoused people in Contra Costa County come from many different backgrounds in terms of race, ethnicity, culture, ability, age, sexual and gender identity, and immigration status. My approach to working with diverse populations is grounded in the understanding that each individual's situation is unique. It is crucial to approach every person with an individual lens, recognizing the specific barriers they can face based on their age, sexual and gender identity, immigration status, and racial, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds. My professional practice is guided by an open-minded and culturally sensitive attitude, which I believe is essential for building trust and providing effective support. Furthermore, my studies for a Master of Social Work (MSW) degree have provided me with advanced knowledge and skills in assessing and screening people from diverse backgrounds to better understand the root causes of their challenges. There are many reasons why unhoused people from diverse backgrounds might have a harder time accessing services. These are often rooted in systemic issues, a lack of cultural understanding, and a failure to provide flexible, person-centered care. Based on my professional experience, here are three key reasons why certain groups face greater barriers.

Systemic and Implicit Bias

Systemic and implicit biases create significant barriers for specific groups, particularly people of color. The disproportionate rate of homelessness among Black and Indigenous communities in Contra Costa County is a clear indicator of these issues. For example, Black individuals represent about 11% of the general population but account for 37% of the unhoused population. This significant disparity points to a system where factors like discrimination in housing, employment, and the criminal justice system create immense barriers. Additionally, members of the LGBTQ+ community often experience discrimination, which can lead to a lack of trust in traditional shelters and programs, making it difficult for them to seek or receive help.

Cultural and Linguistic Barriers

Many service programs are not designed to be culturally or linguistically inclusive. For individuals who do not speak English or come from diverse cultural backgrounds, navigating complex intake forms and understanding program rules can be nearly impossible. When services lack materials in a person's native language or fail to employ culturally competent staff, it can lead to misunderstandings, frustration, and a disconnection from vital resources.

Lack of Tailored Services

A "one-size-fits-all" approach to services fails to meet the unique needs of diverse populations. For instance, people with physical disabilities may find that traditional shelters are not accessible, while unhoused youth need age-appropriate resources that differ from those for adults. Furthermore, individuals with complex legal or immigration statuses may be ineligible for specific housing or financial assistance programs, leaving them with extremely limited options for support.

	Contra Costa County has made significant strides in addressing homelessness. To build on this progress, I propose two ideas that leverage my experience working directly with justice-impacted individuals and the organizations that serve them. My goal is to streamline our efforts and create a more compassionate and effective system for those at risk of or experiencing homelessness.
	1. Expanding and Streamlining Reentry-Specific Housing Subsidies There is a significant need for housing specifically designed for justice-impacted individuals, as they often face immense discrimination and rejection from traditional landlords. My experience working with AB109 and BSCC reentry housing programs, combined with my current work with the Public Defender's Office and within the county jails, has shown me that the demand for these resources far exceeds the available supply.
	To address this, I propose we expand funding for targeted programs like Lao's and Hope Solutions housing initiatives and the Homecoming Project by Impact Justice, which successfully connects formerly incarcerated individuals with vetted homeowners. We should also create a dedicated, housing-first fund for this population and simplify the application process. This would not only reduce recidivism but also help people stabilize their lives and contribute to the community more quickly.
	2. Establish a Reentry Housing Navigation Program Drawing from my experience with the Public Defender's Office and in the county jails, a critical gap exists in the immediate aftermath of release. Many individuals are released with nowhere to go and limited knowledge of how to navigate the complex housing market. The county should establish a dedicated Reentry Housing Navigation Program that provides intensive, one-on-one assistance to justice-impacted individuals prior to and immediately after their release.
	This program would employ housing navigators who specialize in working with formerly incarcerated people. These navigators would start working with individuals while they are still in custody to create a personalized housing plan. This plan would include identifying housing options that are friendly to those with criminal records, assisting with housing applications, securing temporary shelter upon release, and connecting individuals with financial assistance programs. This proactive approach would prevent the cycle of reincarceration and homelessness, as it addresses a root cause of instability at the most critical moment—the transition from jail back to the community. The Reentry Housing Navigation Program would work with the CORE team. The proposed Reentry Housing Navigation Program would complement this by providing a specialized and dedicated "front door" for justice-impacted individuals. Instead of these individuals having to navigate the general CE system on their own immediately after release, they would be met by a dedicated reentry navigator

I can also vide feedback from a unique, dual perspective: my lived experience and my professional experience. In my professional role, I work directly within Contra sta's reentry programs and with the Health, Housing, and Homeless Services (H3) program, focusing specifically on housing.
