RE: CCCWG Legislative Committee June 2026 Report

The committee met on June 13, at 10am; quorum was met. The committee reviewed Bylaws Article VI, Section 2, Item 1 to confirm the responsibilities of the Legislative Committee and accepted the responsibilities. It is understood that only the Commission can approve action on behalf of the Commission; the Legislative Committee's role is to recommend participation in community initiatives or calls to action, when deemed to benefit and protect women and girls in Contra Costa County.

Committee members identified three priorities: 1) monitoring CCC Legislation Committee actions, minutes, and memos, 2) monitoring federal and state legislation that impacts women and girls, and 3) monitoring Contra Costa County budget allocations and process for impact on women and girls. The committee discussed the future prospect of a girls' young advocate training program.

Commissioner Bates was elected as Legislative Committee Chair.

The committee tentatively calendared July 11, 2026, 11am, for the next meeting and second Tuesdays, at 11am, as the standing monthly meeting schedule.

Action Items directed by Committee:

- Commissioner Lucey to introduce Contra Costa County Budget Justice's Sara Gurdian to Chair Bates; Chair Bates to request a budget briefing for next committee meeting.
- All committee members are to review past Contra Costa County Legislation Committee minutes and attend their June 22, 2026, 9am, meeting.
- Committee Chair Bates to contact the Office of Supervisor Scales-Preston to request use of her Pittsburg office for committee's July meeting.
- Commissioner Lucey to forward free state and federal legislation databases to Committee for each member to begin site discovery and exploration.

Recommend for the Commission:

Move to approve the Legislative Committee's work plan to monitor

- 1) the county's Legislation Committee's actions, minutes, and memos,
- 2) the county's budget process and allocations, and
- 3) state and federal legislation for their impact on women and girls in Contra Costa County.
